




INTRODUCTION

The UCD Geary Institute for Public Policy is a centre of excellence for policyrelevant, theoretically informed, empirically grounded research. The Institute supports policy relevant research in empirical social and behavioural sciences, and brings together researchers to stimulate discussion on theories, methodologies, and empirical results. The main disciplines at Geary include: demography, economics, education, law, political science, psychology, public health, social policy, and sociology. The Geary Institute complements and extends the core research expertise of schools, centres and institutes from across University College Dublin, interwoven with international and national research partnerships.

VISION

To position the Geary Institute for Public Policy at the forefront of policy relevant, empirically grounded, theoretically informed research in social and behavioural sciences in UCD, Ireland and Europe, with output centred on 3Ps of - people, papers and policy.

MISSION

To support policy relevant research in the empirical, social, and behavioural sciences, bring together researchers to stimulate cross-disciplinary discussion on theories, methodologies and empirical results, and deliver research impact across the policy lifecycle by disseminating high quality empirical research to inform significant academic and policy debates.



RESEARCH STRENGTHS

The Geary Institute currently has 80 active members and provides research facilities as well as administrative and IT support to over 30 researchers and 45 doctoral students. Between 2017 and 2021 Institute fellows published in excess of 1700 peer-reviewed research papers and other publications. In this same time period recurrent research income from both national and international funding agencies totalled in excess of €21.5M.

Research strengths at Geary map across the four key themes of *Rising to the Future, UCD's Strategy* **2020-2024**, and have particular relevance to *Empowering Humanity* and *Creating a Global Sustainable Society*, especially at the interface between sustainability and equality. Contributions to *Building a Healthy World* are expected to grow with increased membership from the College of Health Sciences. With fellows drawn from over 20 schools and across four different colleges in the University, the Institute is well positioned to forge collaborations across programmes and funding streams.


By collaborating across these disciplines and building linkages with national and international initiatives, UCD Geary Institute researchers ensure that their contributions are relevant to a broad spectrum of academic, social, political and policy debates.

The work of the Geary Institute for Public Policy also complements key objectives of the national research and innovation strategy - Impact 2030 - which was recently launched by the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science.

This includes:

- Pillar One: Maximising The Impact Of Research And Innovation On The Economy, Society And The Environment which aims to ensure that 'Research and innovation makes a real and positive impact – across society, the economy and the environment: improving social wellbeing, our economic prosperity, and sustainability' and
- Pillar Five: All-Island, Eu And Global Connectivity which aims to ensure that research and innovation contributes to a shared island and innovative Europe through strong allisland, European and global R&I collaborations.





The Institute has extensive experience in attracting and hosting EU funded research, particularly Marie Curie Actions, Horizon Europe programmes, in addition to government, industry and philanthropic funding. The Institute has developed outstanding research expertise in the field of longitudinal birth cohort studies over several years and is coordinator of a major Horizon Europe project Growing up in Digital

Europe (GUIDE). The Institute has also hosted and coordinated Irish participation in the European Social Survey since 2018.

OBJECTIVE 1: RETAIN AND BUILD RESEARCH EXCELLENCE AND ENHANCE CAPACITY TO SUPPORT THIS

The Institute aims to build on the existing strong cohort of active fellows and attract and retain exceptional new researchers who can contribute to our research capacity. With this in mind the Institute's membership policy will be revised to enable postdoctoral researchers and policy researchers outside of UCD to become fellows of the Geary Institute.

The recruitment of researchers who possess niche expertise, via transfer of knowledge/training programmes such as Marie Sklodowska Curie programmes, represents an excellent way to build

Researchers who are recruited on EU mobility programmes can also provide a nucleus for future projects and collaborations with EU and International Institutes. It is equally important that these researchers have adequate space, facilities, and pre and post award support in order to fulfil the potential of their research.

OBJECTIVE 2: GROW AND DIVERSIFY THE RESEARCH FUNDING BASE

Researchers at the Geary Institute have been very successful in acquiring research grant income, winning a total of over €27M from 2017-2021. However the national funding landscape for social science research is such that Institute researchers must diversify their funding base and reduce dependency on exchequer sources. The EU's Horizon Europe research funding programme (with an €80 billion budget) represents a real opportunity for Institute researchers to diversify and grow their funding. In particular, Cluster 2, 'Culture, Creativity, and Inclusive Society' of Horizon Europe aims to meet EU goals and priorities on enhancing democratic governance, citizens participation, and to respond to and shape multifaceted social, economic, technological, and cultural transformations.

We are also mindful of the need to encourage collaborations among members across UCD and beyond in order to respond to the 'grand social challenges' which require interrogation by robust research if they are to be met. In particular, the climate action challenges which are key societal challenges and concerns for policy makers and also central to the current Horizon Europe themes. They will require Geary Institute researchers to collaborate with colleagues with environmental and climate scientists and other colleagues outside the social sciences.

The Geary Institute will strongly support its researchers in applying for funding from a diverse range of national and international, governmental and nongovernmental sources and in building the interdisciplinary research collaborations required to secure this funding and comprehensively research the most pressing societal challenges.



OBJECTIVE 3: SUPPORT RESEARCH ACROSS ALL STAGES OF THE RESEARCH LIFE CYCLE

To expand its research output and diversify its sources of funding the Geary Institute will put in place a comprehensive suite of support for research across all stages of the research life cycle. As explained in Figure 1 below these will include support for networking and hosting visiting researchers to enable ideas generation and support collaborations that are a vital first step in producing excellent research. Researchers will also be provided with information, training and specialist advice to enable

them to identify research funding opportunities and, when they are ready to make an application, Institute staff will provide the administrative and financial management support required. The Institute will also provide comprehensive post award support for research, including management of grant registration and consortia agreements, budgets and recruitment and provision of IT support office space for researchers, meeting and seminar rooms.


OBJECTIVE 4 STRENGTHEN RESEARCH IMPACT ACROSS ALL STAGES OF THE POLICY LIFECYCLE

The Geary Institute will increase efforts to give internal and external visibility to the Institute and its research, particularly among the policy community and to maximise the impact of Institute research on policy. This will include strengthening existing links with Irish government departments and agencies, regulatory bodies, hospitals, and international policy research institutes.

The Geary Institute will develop improved structures and systems to facilitate a smooth interface thereby ensuring a "sustained interactivity" between Institute researchers and the policy community. As explained in the diagram below it will encompass engagement across all stages of the policy cycle.

Generating and analysing data to inform policy planning and identify currently unmet needs and likely future needs will be central to Institute's policy impact activities. This type of 'policy agenda setting' research is challenging for policy makers to conduct or commission. Consequently it is at this stage in the policy cycle that academic research can have the strongest impact. The Publicpolicy.ie online policy research dissemination portal, which has flourished since its incorporation into the Geary Institute in 2018, will also be central to the Institute's policy engagement activities and in particular to enabling the communication of research findings to policy makers which can inform policy reform.
