University College Dublin is the 2006 Sunday Times University of the Year after one of the biggest makeovers in its 152-year history. This month, the slimmed-down academic structure will see the introduction of the largest range of new cross-disciplinary courses it has ever offered.

Those entering many of UCD's existing degree courses, also, will have more choice about what they study. Full-time undergraduates, for example, can now take two modules a year from outside their core degree area. This has helped push up applications by 10%.

The sprawling campus, two miles from Dublin city centre, has been likened to a former East German town in architectural terms. Social life is centred on its campus bars and other events take place in the city centre.

Despite a significant fall in points demanded to gain entry, UCD still has the second-best-qualified entrants in the republic. Given its high-calibre intake, it is little wonder that the number of

students getting a first or 2:1 has jumped from 46% in 2004 to 66% last year.

The dropout rate is low at about one in seven and UCD also has one of the lowest graduate unemployment rates at 2.7%.

The university is recruiting more non-standard entrants, including mature students and those from socially disadvantaged areas, who now make up 16.8% of the intake. Its six-year-old New Era programme, aimed at greater access for poorer areas, has seen 254 graduates, including nine in medicine.

The campus has 2,650 beds for students. One in five first-years lives in. At €89 to €112 a week, campus rooms can cost much less than private ones.

Student support services, sports facilities and societies are among the country's best. The creche was renovated last year and another is to open this year. An iconic entrance building, with an art-house cinema, shops and cafes, is also planned and the open spaces are being upgraded.
