National and international experiences of inequality have come into greater focus in recent years. Driven by new data and new research insights, increased attention is being given to ways in which the causes and outcomes of these inequalities can be addressed.

Central to many of these discussions has been a proposal for societies to provide a stable and recurring income floor via a Universal Basic Income. In Ireland, these debates highlight a long-standing interest in a Basic Income as an alternative to much of the current, and complex, redistributive system.

This half-day conference provides an opportunity to explore this proposal and investigate the context, attitudes, options and challenges around the adoption of a Basic Income in Ireland. The conference also marks the tenth anniversary of the 12th BIEN International Congress on Basic Income which was held at UCD during 2008.

TRAVELING TO AND FROM UCD

Buses:

The following buses serve UCD from Dublin City Centre: 39A (direct to campus), 46A (N11 entrance) and 145 (N11 entrance). The campus is also served by a number of Bus Eireann routes, Wexford Bus and Aircoach.

The conference venue is a short walk from the 39A campus bus stop (walk around part of the lake) or walking from the N11 entrance walk straight onto campus, veer to the left just after the AIB bank and the Quinn School is opposite the lake.

Driving:

There is a limited amount of car parking available on the UCD campus which is available on a first come first served basis and is free of charge outside term time (including the period when the conference is taking place). If driving, enter via the N11 Stillorgan Road entrance (see map attached) and turn left once you have entered the campus and continue to drive along this road until you see a Centra Shop on the left. Parking is available opposite the shop and further past the shop (after the building site). Both car parks are adjacent to the conference venue.
