- Increased emphasis placed on self-care both in training and in professional practice








Where do Social Workers Work?

UCD's 3 + 2 Pathway to Social Work


- 3 year undergraduate B Soc Sc (Social Policy and Sociology) (DN750) plus 2 year
 Professional Masters in Social Work
- DN700 does not make you eligible
- Second year DN750 students can apply for a place on the Masters programme, and if successful their place will be held for them until they have graduated from their degree.
- Professional Masters in Social Work is a two year degree, with each year involving a semester in college and a semester in a social work agency.
- Mix of students of different ages & ethnicities, including mature students.
