
UCD Access & Lifelong Learning

There are now **seven alternative entry pathways** which enable you to study at UCD.

UNIVERSITY ACCESS

Access programmes help mature students prepare for study at degree level in UCD, particularly for those who may not have formal qualifications. Those that achieve the required GPA are guaranteed entry to; Arts & Humanities, Social Sciences, Law, Science, Computer Science, Medicine*, Engineering and Agricultural Science.

OPEN LEARNING This part-time option opens up hundreds of undergraduate modules to anyone interested in either sampling a subject, or in accumulating credit towards a certificate or diploma. Students who successfully complete the Certificate in Open Learning can apply through the CAO for a degree in Arts & Humanities or Social Sciences in UCD.
