Universities play a multifaceted role in promoting innovation, economic growth and the long term competitiveness of a nation through education, research and the establishment of meaningful partnerships and collaborations.

Organizations represented included: DHL express Ireland, Investec, Praesta, Concern Worldwide, Philanthropy Ireland, Deloitte, Future Analytics, Allegro Ltd, Value-Added Africa, Plan Ireland and the Constitutional Reform Commission.

The key note speech was given by our very own Adjourn Professor Catherine Bragg (Former Assistant Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Deputy Emergency Relief Coordinator in the UN) who presented the concept of creating shared value and the opportunities and challenges of private sector involvement in humanitarian action. Brian Kelly of Pioneer Scientific Consulting followed with an informative presentation on the research and funding opportunities for private sector companies interested in humanitarian action.

The floor was then left open for meaningful discussion in which both sectors expressed their views on the role and potential of private sector/humanitarian collaborations and what this would look like in the future. The theme - *creating shared value* (ways of working together towards creating a win-win situation that meets both humanitarian and business objectives) was also discussed in great detail.

We are very pleased with the results of the breakfast meeting.
