What is the title of your project	Getting Around UCD: Accessible Route Videos
What is the aim, impact and expected outcomes of this Project	We will produce a series of short videos demonstrating the accessible routes around UCD Campus. These videos will have a significant impact for visitors to the campus and new students with mobility difficulties. These videos will also assist towards creating a more inclusive environment for everyone to enjoy and the videos will demonstrate the most popular routes around campus to allow people with mobility difficulties to easily get around campus. Expected Outcomes: A series of short videos will be posted on UCD's website and can be linked to for all UCD events, conferences etc. so that UCD is an accessible campus for all members of the community.
What are the origins of this proposal?	Every year we have a number of students who find it very difficult to navigate the campus. Dara Ryder produced a video for a conference hosted in UCD by AHEAD. The video showed how to get from the N11 entrance to the Science building and combined the map, video and voice over which we thought worked extremely well. Conference delegates also commented on how useful the video was when they got to UCD. We would like to build on the success of this video and create a UCD resource showing a number of accessible routes around campus. We have chosen to use an external provider for this project as IT services/Media services do not currently have capacity in their workplan to complete the project.
