Understanding your Degree

These are part-time multidisciplinary graduate programmes, designed for graduates who are engaged in Occupational Safety and Health (OSH), who have not previously achieved a higher level qualification in OSH. At the end of their programme, students will have developed the ability to develop and implement health and safety management and risk management systems relevant to the OSH needs of their professional discipline; professional and academic writing skills; self-management and self-directive skills and research skills.

Admission requirements

- Applicants should be honours graduates (2.1 or above) of a level 8 degree in a cognate discipline.
- They should normally be working adults.
- They should have at least 3 years work experience at the time of application.
- Priority is given to those active in Occupational Safety and Health.
- Applicants must supply transcripts of their primary degree and all supporting documentation at the time of application.

Mapping your Diploma/Degree

- This programme is mapped at level 9 on the National Qualifications Authority of Ireland (NQAI) framework.
- On successful completion of this programme, graduates will be able to progress to a variety of graduate degrees.

- Health and Safety Management
- OSH Research Literature Review
- Occupational Health
- Occupational Hygiene
- Risk Assessment and Safety Statement
- Human and Organisational Behaviour at Work
- Applied Research Methods and Data Management

- Safety Technology
- Dissertation (for MSc in OSH students)

Commitment required of students

- This part-time programme is designed to be completed over two full years. The Graduate Diploma in OSH will be completed over five semesters, while the MSc in OSH programme will be completed over six semesters.
- Assignments, project work and self-directed learning are required during the summer semester between the two academic years of study, and MSc students will complete their dissertation during the summer semester at the end of the second academic years.
- Lectures will normally be held on Fridays for students in Year 1 and on Tuesdays for students in Year 2.
- Attendance on occasional Saturdays may be required. MSc in OSH supervision takes place outside of scheduled programme time.
- Assessment strategies include continuous assessment, assignments, projects and examinations.
- UCD expects that students who register to its programmes are in a position to commit to attending and being available on scheduled programme and assessment dates.

Career opportunities

The Graduate Diploma in OSH programme is designed for graduates who are practising OSH professionals, who have not previously achieved a higher qualification in occupational safety and health. The MSc in OSH programme is for such graduates who have an interest in undertaking research in OSH. Successful completion of these programmes qualifies candidates to apply for graduate membership of IOSH (UK) and, subject to experience and other entry requirements, graduates may become a chartered member of the Institute (CMIOSH) and use the title Chartered Safety and Health Practitioner. - Successful applicants will be notified promptly.
- Closing date for receipt of completed applications is the last working day of June.
- Late applicants will be considered if the quota is not reached by applicants who have applied on time.
- An orientation day will be held on Friday September 4th 2015. Attendance at the orientation day is mandatory.

How to apply

What must be provided with each application?

All of the following items must be submitted on or before the application closing date. They may be submitted online or in hard copy format.

- CV (maximum 2 pages).
- A personal statement of approximately 500 words. The personal statement should focus on the applicant's interest in OSH, how they expect the programme will impact on their career and how they plan to balance their work, life and study commitments.
- Copies of degree parchments as well as full transcripts of results.
- Applicants whose first language is not English must submit the original certificate of completion of an English test.

English language requirements

- Applicants whose first language is not English and whose primary degree was obtained in a country where English is not the official language of instruction must provide proof of proficiency in English such as IELTS or TOEFL.
- The original certificate of completion of an English language test must be submitted with the application.
- Test results must not be more than 2 years old.
