Nursing & Midwifery Study Abroad Programme


The Study Abroad Programme at the UCD School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems aims to provide an exciting opportunity to advance your knowledge of nursing and midwifery while studying at one of Ireland's leading universities. The aim of our school is to provide our students with the very best opportunities and supports to pursue studies in nursing, midwifery and to promote safe, person-centered professional practice.

As the oldest university school of nursing and midwifery in Ireland we have played a leading role in the development of nursing and midwifery education, practice and research nationally. We offer four undergraduate programmes which provide entry to professional practice in general nursing, psychiatric nursing, children's and general nursing and midwifery. Studying at our school offers you the opportunity to meet other students from many cultures and countries.

Subject Choices

Study abroad students may select from a comprehensive range of undergraduate nursing and midwifery modules. Students may also select 2 non-nursing and midwifery modules.

These modules may be chosen from a number of programmes across the university.



Facilities

The UCD Nursing and Midwifery courses are delivered in a state-of-the-art learning environment. The Health Sciences Centre consists of top class lecture facilities, a purpose built clinical skills centre with interactive video equipment, library, computing resources and student resource rooms. The School is linked with national centres of excellence and our partner hospitals include: St. Vincent's Healthcare Group, the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital, St. John of God Hospital, Our Lady's Children's Hospital, the National Maternity Hospital and Our Lady's Hospice.

Research Programmes

The UCD School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems is unique in having an academic centre dedicated to the development of programmatic research in older persons care.

- The National Centre for the Protection of Older People is conducting new ground breaking research which is informing national social policy in recognizing at-risk older people, raising awareness about elder abuse and protecting older people from the risk of maltreatment.
- In addition, the School has research programmes in health systems, palliative care, mental health nursing, cancer care and midwifery history.

Study abroad students have access to the full range of undergraduate modules available at UCD* (* subject to capacity and timetabling). You can register for up to four modules in your subject area and up to two modules from other Programme areas. You may also take all of your modules within your chosen subject area.*

Assessment is based on a combination of in-semester components such as projects, class based assignments and formal examinations which take place at the end of each semester ie in December and May.
