
UCD is a distinctively Irish university but with global impact.


- UCD is a member of several international research and education networks such as Universitas 21 (U21), Erasmus, UNICA and EUC.

#### Planning Your Career: Help from the UCD Career Development Centre

It is important that you assess your future career as you progress through university, and take advantage of the services, expertise and development opportunities that UCD and the UCD Career Development Centre can offer. Our role is to help you find what you're looking for and to prepare you for it, so consider these four steps which will give you the best start possible:

#### 1. Engage

In order to get the most from UCD, and to impress your future employer, it is important to develop a rounded profile. In addition to a successful academic profile, employers will expect you to have been engaged during your time at UCD. We recommend that you get actively involved in something you value, enjoy and see as worthwhile, for example: join some of the student societies and sports clubs or try volunteering.

#### 2. Develop

#### **Recruitment Fairs**

The UCD Career Development Centre connects students with graduate recruiters through an outstanding network of national and international employers. We engage employers in curriculum-based workshops, presentations and skills development sessions.

Every year the Career Development Centre delivers a comprehensive programme of recruitment fairs and employer events for UCD students. Annual recruitment fairs include the **Business, Finance and Management Recruitment Fair** and the **Science, Engineering and Technology Recruitment Fair.** Each of these fairs attracts 50+ high profile graduate recruiters, most of whom are multi-national organisations. The annual **Law Recruitment Fair** attracts top Irish and international law firms, while the annual **Internships Fair** connects students with employers offering paid internship opportunities, many of which can lead to graduate employment.

In addition to our suite of large recruitment fairs, the Career Development Centre also works with academic schools across the University to deliver bespoke recruitment events. # **Research with global impact**

As Ireland's number one university for research funding, UCD is at the forefront of global knowledge and research studies that have real societal impact. Since the highest level research is, by its nature, global in scope, UCD fosters collaboration with the 'best of the best' researchers across the world. The University has a focus on five research priorities which map to critical global research challenges; we collaborate with industry worldwide to develop knowledge and solutions within these priority areas.

#### **UCD Research priorities**

#### Culture, Economy and Society

UCD is renowned for its work in Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

Many of UCD's leading scholars have shaped modern Ireland and our place in the world, and through their research and scholarship they have made sense of our history and culture.

#### Energy and Environment

At UCD we are working to find solutions to the energy and environment challenges of the 21st century.

In energy we concentrate on areas where Ireland has a competitive advantage.

The UCD Earth Institute aims to provide solutions to some of Ireland's most urgent environmental problems

#### Healt

Healthcare is evolving rapidly, driven by changes in population demographics, by discoveries in biochemical research and by emerging technologies.

At UCD, we are re-imagining the future of healthcare, one where new therapies, webenabled technologies and home-deployed devices emerge from the symbiosis of technology and biology.

#### Agri-Food

The agri-food and agri-business sector is Ireland's largest indigenous industry. Employing more than 150,000 people, it is critical to Ireland's economy and is the foundation of our culture and society

# **Graduate Research at UCD**

In addition to the range of taught programmes such as Graduate Certificates, Graduate Diplomas and taught MA or MSc programmes, UCD offers a number of options for graduate students to undertake research. All graduate programmes at UCD have associated levels assigned to them in accordance with the NFQ (National Framework of Qualifications) to ensure the highest comparable international standards.

#### **Research Degrees**

A research degree involves the sustained and in-depth study of a specific topic, which is then written up as a thesis for examination. Research degrees involve students carrying out their own research and academic study under the supervision of a principal academic supervisor with the support of a masters or Doctoral studies panel. The precise focus of research is agreed between the supervisor and the student. Research can be carried out at masters or Doctoral level.

#### **Research Masters Degree (Level 9)**

Research masters degrees provide education and training in a particular subject through original exploration and research. A research masters usually takes one to two years full-time or two to four years part-time to complete. The research culminates in a thesis which sets out the conclusions of the research undertaken. The assessment and award of the degree is on the basis of the thesis.

#### UCD Structured PhD (Level 10)

The UCD structured PhD aims to enable UCD PhD students to achieve the best possible experience of graduate research and training. Making a substantial and original contribution to knowledge, normally leading to peer-reviewed publications, remains the core objective of doctoral studies. The structured PhD includes several innovative measures designed to support you in achieving your academic and professional objectives. A PhD typically takes 3 years full-time (6 years part-time) to complete. Assessment for the award of a PhD is on the basis of a thesis which is assessed at a viva-voce exam.

#### How to apply for a PhD Position at UCD

#### Step by step

**Step 1** Identify a suitable supervisor in your preferred area of study

#### Culture, Economy & Society



**Professor Joseph McMahon** Professor of Commercial Law at the UCD Sutherland School of Law

Professor McMahon's primary research interests, in which he has published extensively, are in the area of agricultural trade law in both the World Trade Organization and the EU, as well as in the area of the EU's Development Cooperation Policy; with particular interest in the relationship with the African, Caribbean and Pacific countries.

#### Data Science



Professor Pádraig Cunningham Professor of Knowledge and Data Engineering and Head of the UCD School of Computer Science

Professor Cunningham has been involved in research in Data Analytics for over 20 years and has published over 200 papers in the area. He is a founding director of the Insight Centre for Data Analytics (insight-centre.org) and the Centre for Applied Data Analytics (ceadar.ie) both located in UCD. Through CeADAR and Insight, the UCD School of Computer Science collaborates with over 70 companies on Data Science research.

#### Culture, Economy & Society



**Professor Maria Baghramian** Professor in the UCD School of Philosophy

Professor Baghramian's main research areas are Philosophy of Language, Contemporary American Philosophy (Putnam, Davidson, Rorty and Quine), Relativism, Topics in Cognitive Science; her publications primarily focus on the topic of intractable disagreements in beliefs and values and on Neo-Pragmatism. She was the Chief Editor of the International Journal of Philosophical Studies (2003-2013) and is currently an editor of the journal Contemporary Pragmatism.

A consultant to a number of leading European, US and Asian corporations, he has also completed assignments with governmental organisations, the International Monetary Fund and the United Nations.

Professor Higgins expertise is in Bioinformatics, DNA Sequencing and Gene Array Analysis. In June 2016, Professor Higgins received the Kimura Motoo award in recognition of his significant contributions to the advancement of evolutionary biology. In 2014, *Nature* placed him in the top 10 most-cited bioinformatics researchers of all time. He is the most highly cited author in Ireland, reaching over 100,000 citations.

Professor Gerwarth has held research fellowships or visiting professorships at Harvard University, the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, and Sciences Po Paris. In 2013-14 he was a Humboldt Senior Research Fellow at the Herder Institute and a Braudel Fellow at the European University Institute. He is an elected Member of the Royal Irish Academy and the Young Academy of Europe, and a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

Associate Professor Emmeline Hill Associate Professor in Equine Science at the UCD School of Agriculture and Food Science

Associate Professor Hill's globally renowned research explores genetic contributions to variation in exercise physiology parameters in the thoroughbred horse. In 2010 she published the world's first description of a gene contributing to a specific athletic trait in horses, which has been dubbed 'The Speed Gene' and in research published in *Nature* in 2012, she traced its origins. Associate Professor Hill is the co-founder and Chairman of the UCD spin-out company Equinome which was acquired by Plusvital in December 2015.

Professor of Electrical Engineering at the UCD School of Electrical & Electronic Engineering

Professor O Malley is recognised as a world authority on Energy Systems Integration and in particular Grid Integration of Renewable Energy. He has active research collaborations in Europe, the United States (US) and China and is Director and co-founder of the International Institute for Energy Systems Integration. He has consulted with clients across the world including; the International Energy Agency, the US Department of Energy, National Renewable Energy Laboratory, the US Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the Energy Foundation.

# **UCD Research Funding**

Students are advised to contact the UCD School in which they are interested in studying to ask about current funding possibilities. In addition please consult the following sites regarding other sources of funding.

The Irish Research Council manages a suite of inter-linked research schemes, funding scholars at various career stages, from postgraduate study to senior research project-based awards. For early stage researchers there are a number of funding opportunities operated by open, peer-reviewed funding competitions. These include: The Government of Ireland Post-Graduate Scholarships and Government of Ireland Post-Doctoral Fellowships, which fund research at pre- and post-doctoral levels.

The Enterprise Partnership Scheme is an innovative initiative where the Irish Research Council links with private enterprise and eligible public bodies to award co-funded postgraduate scholarships and postdoctoral fellowships to the most promising researchers in Ireland.

The Irish Research Council's Employment-Based Postgraduate Programme is an initiative providing postgraduate researchers with an employment-focused educational experience.

More specifically, this Programme offers researchers the opportunity to undertake a Master's or PhD degree while employed by a private company or public organisation based in the Republic of Ireland. Further information at www.research.ie

Science Foundation Ireland (SFI) is the national foundation for investment in scientific- and engineering research. SFI invests in academic researchers and research teams who are likely to generate new knowledge, cutting edge technologies and competitive enterprises in the three broad areas of Biotechnology; Information & Communications Technology (ICT) and Sustainable Energy & Energy Efficient Technologies (Energy). #### International Students

The estimates above do not include the cost of flights or insurance. You should also budget for any initial costs you will likely incur (e.g. you might need to budget for short-term accommodation upon arrival in Dublin). Also please note that all non-Irish nationals, who are not citizens of the EU/EEA or Switzerland, must register in person with the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB) after arrival and after completion of registration at UCD. The GNIB will issue you with a residence permit/GNIB card. The fee for this card is €300 (correct as of July 2016) and should be included in your budgeting calculations.



# **Applying to UCD**

The normal requirement for entry to a taught Masters Degree programme is a second class honours degree in a relevant subject. However intending applicants should check the individual requirements, since some degrees may require a higher standard for entry. For applicants who do not have the required minimal entry standard, a year-long qualifying course may be available in some cases.

For Masters by research degrees, course work and examinations may also be specified by the College at entry; normally these have to be satisfactorily completed in the first year of a Masters degree programme. To be eligible to enter one of UCD's PhD programmes, a candidate must have reached a high honours standard in their primary degree. In a significant number of cases, a Masters degree may also be required. Specific information on entry requirements can be found on the relevant UCD School Website.

If English is not your first language, you may need an IELTS score of (normally) 6.5 (with no component below 6.0) or equivalent to be considered for most programmes.

The normal requirement for entry to a taught Masters degree programme is a second class honours degree in a relevant subject.

# **English Language Proficiency**

#### Language Proficiency

Teaching in Irish Universities is normally through the medium of English. All applicants are therefore required to demonstrate a high level of competence in the English language. Applicants must provide evidence of this through a recognised English test, as outlined below.

- Your English language certificate must be no more than two years old at the beginning of your degree course.
- Other evidence of proficiency in English may be accepted. For further advice please contact UCD International Admissions: internationaladmissions@ucd.ie to check if we will accept it. When enquiring, please inform us of the following: the name, level and date of the qualification, the country in which it was taken, and the scores you obtained. If possible, please send a scanned copy of the certificate and transcripts (if available) showing as much as possible of the information above.

UCD normally requires an overall Academic IELTS score of 6.5 with a minimum of 6.0 in each band. A list of recognised English language examinations is available at www.ucd.ie/international/study-at-ucd-global/ucdenglishlanguagerequirements.

**Note:** Some UCD Graduate Programmes require a higher standard of English language proficiency; please check the individual requirements for further information.

#### **English for Academic Purposes Programmes**

The UCD Applied Language Centre provides a range of programmes for students whose first language is not English and who wish to improve their English before commencing an undergraduate or graduate programme at UCD. Applications are welcome from students who require an intensive period of English language preparation to meet university entry requirements and to provide students with a grounding in academic procedures and autonomous study.

**Note:** It is the responsibility of the applicant to check whether or not these programmes are deemed acceptable by the Schools to which they have applied.

#### Student visas and immigration

Some but not all non-EU/EEA students require an entry visa for Ireland. You can check on the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service website (www.inis.gov.ie) for the list of countries that do not require a visa. If your country is not on the list, then you require a visa.

For example – US, Canadian, Brazilian and Malaysian students do not require a visa but Indian, Chinese and Russian students do.

If you are applying from China, India, Nigeria, Russia or the United Arab Emirates, please also check the Irish Embassy website for details of further documentation which may be required.

Note: Ireland is not a member of the Schengen Agreement. You will, therefore, still have to apply for an Irish visa even if you have a visa for a Schengen country.

#### Medical and travel insurance

**EU Nationals:** Students from EU Member States in possession of the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) are entitled to public health services in Ireland. The EHIC card is available from the health authorities in your home country. For further information and information on your entitlements to healthcare while in Ireland, please see the European Health Insurance Card website (www.ehic.ie).

**Non-EU Nationals:** Because of the regulations of the Garda National Immigration Bureau (GNIB), non-EU students must obtain private health insurance. UCD does not arrange health insurance for students. You can purchase insurance in your home country, however you will need to ensure that it is valid in Ireland and in any other countries that you plan to travel to.



### **Term dates**

Most programmes start at the beginning of the academic year early September. The start date for your programme will be stated on your offer letter. Research programmes can start at the beginning of September, January or May.
