UCD Volunteers Overseasa joint effort

This summer six members of UCD staff — Owen Fallon, Student Adviser Computer Science; Ann Cullen, Conway Institute; Frank Monahan, School of Agriculture, Food Science and Veterinary Medicine; Malachy O'Rourke, School of Mechanical, Electrical and Electronic Engineering, and Deirdre Hegarty, UCD Smurfit School — joined Fr Tony Coote and 53 students on overseas development projects in Delhi and Haiti.

Delhi

UCD Volunteers Overseas worked on various projects, which the organisation has supported continually since July 2003. These included literacy programmes for underprivileged children, working with mentally and physically handicapped orphans, constructing an extension to the two-room school built last year, and building an additional three classroom school in the same slum.

Haiti

Haiti is one of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere, and Port au Prince, the country's capital, has a reputation for serious violence. However, much of the reporting about Haiti is told through the eyes of the capital, and little is know about the rural parts of the country.

This summer, UCD Volunteers spent a month working in Gros Morne, one such rural area, hosted by the Sisters of Jesus and Mary who have worked in the area for eight years. UCD Volunteers Overseas helped to renovate the Kaipo, or poorhouse, which is a home for the elderly and homeless adults, as well as digging ditches in the hills to correct ravines, building dry walls and planting grass; working alongside locals this will stem the effects and dangers of flooding in the area. The group also put pvc piping on 120 homes and supplied them with barrels to collect water. Elsewhere, students organised and managed a sports camp for teenagers and younger children from the surrounding hills.
