



What Are Access Courses?

Access courses at UCD are Special Purpose **Level 6 Diploma Awards**. They are year-long, part-time, foundation programmes designed to introduce students to university life and learning.

We offer two Access courses:

- **AHSSL: Diploma in Access to Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences & Law.**
- **SEAM+: Diploma in Access to Science, Computer Science, Sustainability, Engineering, Agricultural Science, Medicine and Veterinary Medicine.**

Courses are designed to build your skills and confidence while providing the flexibility to balance your studies with other life commitments.

What's included?

- Small class sizes.
- Supportive learning environment.
- Study skills workshops.
- Degree progression opportunities.

If you successfully complete an Access Programme and get the required Grade Point Average (GPA) you'll have the chance to apply for a set number of guaranteed places on a range of UCD Degree Programmes (See pg 10 and pg 27 - 28).

About Access to AHSSL

Access to AHSSL (Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences & Law) is the oldest Access course in Ireland and is designed to prepare learners for successful study at university. It leads to a Special Purpose QQI Level 6 Diploma Award.

Our programme is student-centred, offering you dedicated support and guidance throughout your Access year. You'll experience a wide range of teaching approaches, including:

- Group work.
- Case studies.
- Reviews.
- In-class discussions in both small and large supportive group settings.

You will experience a wide range of assessments, such as:

- Reflective journals.
- Presentations.
- Essays.
- Exams.

During your University Access year, you'll have the opportunity to:

- Sample university lectures.
- Hear from UCD colleagues about degree options.
- Meet Access graduates who can share their experiences and insights to help you make informed decisions about your CAO application and your next steps towards a degree.

As a University Access student, you'll also be welcome to take part in additional academic skills workshops, digital literacy sessions, and the full range of supports offered by UCD Access and Lifelong Learning.

This is your chance to build the skills, confidence and knowledge to begin your journey to university and beyond.

Progression Opportunities

Students who achieve a **Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.6** or more can apply for a **guaranteed minimum number of places** on the following degree programmes in UCD¹.

- BA Arts (DN520)
- BA Humanities (DN530)
- BCL Law (DN600)
- BSc Social Sciences (DN700)
- BSocSc Social Policy & Sociology (DN750)
- BSc Criminology with Psychology (DN620)
- BSc Psychology (DN720)*

In addition to meeting the required standard on the course, you must make an application through the CAO for your progression. *An asterisk (*)* means a different GPA or requirements apply.

Please note: To be considered for progression to **BSC Psychology (CAO code DN720)**, you will need a **GPA of 3.08 or higher**.

How the Course Works



Core Modules

The core modules in Access to AHSSL are key to your success as a university student. We have been working with Access students for decades and have established that the key to a positive outcome is having good study skills. How you study, and the habits you develop during the year, will sustain and support you as you progress through UCD. Our Study Skills are taught in a positive and accessible way. You will learn the key approaches and skills you need to be an effective and engaged student.

You can then put your skills into practice with your optional subjects. There are additional free academic workshops and supports you can also use to support your learning on the University Access course.

These three core modules are compulsory for all students.

- 1. First Steps** - Introduction to Higher Education - Autumn
- 2. Digital Literacy for University** - Autumn
- 3. Applied Academic Writing** - Spring

In the autumn trimester, you will register for two core study skills modules First Steps in Higher Education (5 credits) and Digital Literacy (5 credits) along with one optional module.






Requirements

Age Requirement

- University Access Mature applicants (You must be 22 or over on January 1st of the year you apply).
- University Access Young Adult applicants (You must be 21 or under on January 1st of the year you apply and must meet the stated access criteria - see pg 21).

English Language Requirement

- If English is not your first language, you must satisfy UCD's English Language requirements. A score of 6.5 in an IELTS or equivalent exam is required. Please find full details on UCD's Minimum English Language requirements as well as a list of acceptable qualifications on this webpage: <https://www.ucd.ie/registry/prospectivestudents/admissions/policiesandgeneralregulations/generalrequirements/minimumenglishlanguagerequirements/>
- If you do not have this formal qualification and would like further information on the assessment options listed, please contact all@ucd.ie



There are no other formal entry requirements, but you must:

- Be able to demonstrate a readiness to pursue third level programmes and a level of learning ability suitable to do so.
- Share life experience and any formal or informal learning undertaken. Provide as much information as you think is relevant on the application form and include all educational history.
- Attend an informal interview and complete a short written assessment on the day. In the written assessment you must demonstrate engagement and interest in your response to the question.

Please note: Applicants who already hold a level 8 degree qualification are not eligible to apply.

Access Criteria for Young Adults

UCD is delighted to welcome students under 22 to apply for the Access to AHSSL Programme. This is specifically for applicants who have experienced socio-economic disadvantage and/or educational disadvantage.

To be eligible, you **must meet three of the criteria** below:

- 1.** You have attended a DEIS post primary school for at least two years.
- 2.** Your household income last year must be on or below €55,924.
- 3.** You or your family are/were in receipt of a medical card/GP visit card that was in date at the end of last year.
- 4.** Your family received a means tested payment from the Department of Social Protection for at least 26 weeks last year.
- 5.** You live in an area of urban or rural disadvantage. To meet this indicator your address must be in an area classified as disadvantaged, very disadvantaged or extremely disadvantaged. We use [Pobal Maps](#) to verify area of disadvantage.
- 6.** Your parents/guardians have not gone to college.

OR

You can provide proof that you are eligible for HEAR (Higher Education Access Route) from either last year or this academic year.


Applying



Once you have submitted an online application you will be invited to come and meet with us for an informal interview. During this time, you will also be asked to produce a short written piece. This written piece will form the basis of a conversation where we can explore how the course meets your needs and expectations. The interview is an opportunity for you to discuss your study plans, as well as allowing us the space to discuss whether the access course will suit you at this point. After the interview, you will be informed of whether you are being offered a place on the course.

Interviews are typically scheduled during June, July, and August by arrangement.

Fees

The fee for the Access Course to Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences and Law (AHSSL) Programme is €890 for this academic year. This can be subject to change year on year so please refer to the website for the most up to date information:

About SEAM+

Access to SEAM+ is a Special Purpose Level 6 Diploma Award designed to prepare adult learners for successful study at university, especially in the areas of Science, Engineering, Agricultural Science, Computer Science, Sustainability, Medicine and Vet Medicine.

Our programme is student-centred, meaning you'll have dedicated support and guidance throughout your Access year.

You'll experience a variety of teaching approaches, including:

- **Lectures**
- **Laboratory experience**
- **In-class discussions in small group settings**

This Access course is perfect for adults who may not have formal qualifications but have the ambition and interest to pursue university study.

Applicants must be 22 or over on January 1st of the year they apply for SEAM+ to qualify as a university access mature applicant.

Our aim is to:

- Facilitate you in finding a degree course that best suits your aptitude and interest.
- Give you the confidence and skills necessary to plan and organise study for your particular needs.
- Provide you with analytical skills to fully understand the material presented in all subject modules.
- Equip you with the skills and confidence to take on a degree course in Science, Computer Science, Sustainability, Engineering, Agricultural Science, Medicine, or Veterinary Medicine.

Throughout the year, you'll be supported every step of the way as you build your skills, confidence, and future.

Progression Opportunities

Students who achieve a **Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.08** or more can apply for a **guaranteed minimum number of places** on the following degree programmes in UCD².

- Bachelor of Science (CAO number DN200)
- Bsc Sustainability (CAO number DN240)
- Bachelor of Computer Science (CAO number DN201)
- Bachelor of Agriculture (CAO number DN250/DN261)
- Bachelor of Engineering (CAO number DN150)*
- Medicine (CAO number DN400)**
- Veterinary Medicine (CAO number DN300)**

* Entry to Engineering is also contingent on obtaining an A- or higher in each of the mathematics modules.

** Entry to Medicine is also contingent on obtaining a minimum grade of A- in the module 'Introduction to Chemistry, Physics & Biology'. Applicants will be required to submit a learning journal and obtain an expected HPAT Ireland score of 150. Two places will be offered per year and will be allocated on a competitive basis. 
*** Entry to Veterinary Medicine is also contingent on obtaining a minimum grade A- in the module 'Introduction to Chemistry, Physics & Biology'.

Entry to Veterinary Medicine will require a minimum of 60 hours animal experience, with one or more species. The animal experience should be within the past two years. Applicants will be required to submit a report reflecting on this experience and their interest in the Veterinary profession. Applicants will be interviewed to assess their Critical Thinking, Communication Skills and their Interest and Knowledge of the Veterinary profession and the veterinary course.

² Where there are more qualified applicants for entry (i.e., students with a GPA greater than 3.08) than there are places, the allocation will be made by highest GPA.

In addition to meeting the required standard on the course, you must be eligible to apply on the grounds of mature years and make an application through the CAO.


How the Course Works



English Language Requirement

- If English is not your first language, you must satisfy UCD's English Language requirements. A score of 6.5 in an IELTS or equivalent exam is required. There are no other formal entry requirements, but you must:

- Be able to demonstrate a readiness to pursue third level programmes and a level of learning ability suitable to do so.
- Share life experience and any formal or informal learning undertaken. Provide as much information as you think is relevant on the application form and include all educational history. Evidence of recent prior learning is most relevant, ability in maths, and prior learning in at least one of the science subjects is important.
- Complete the Maths & Written Assessment: The selection process includes a Maths assessment, Science lecture & written piece to be shortlisted for interview.

Please note: The purpose of this pathway is to provide an access route to those who have not yet had the opportunity to attend university. **Those who have successfully completed a QQI Level 8 degree will not be considered.** Those with a QQI Level 7 degree, who have no progression route to obtain a Level 8 may be considered.





Applying

There are four steps in applying for SEAM+ Programme:

- Complete an Online Application.
- Attend four pre-entry maths workshops (including a maths assessment).
- Attend a pre-entry science lecture (including a short written assignment).
- Interview.


