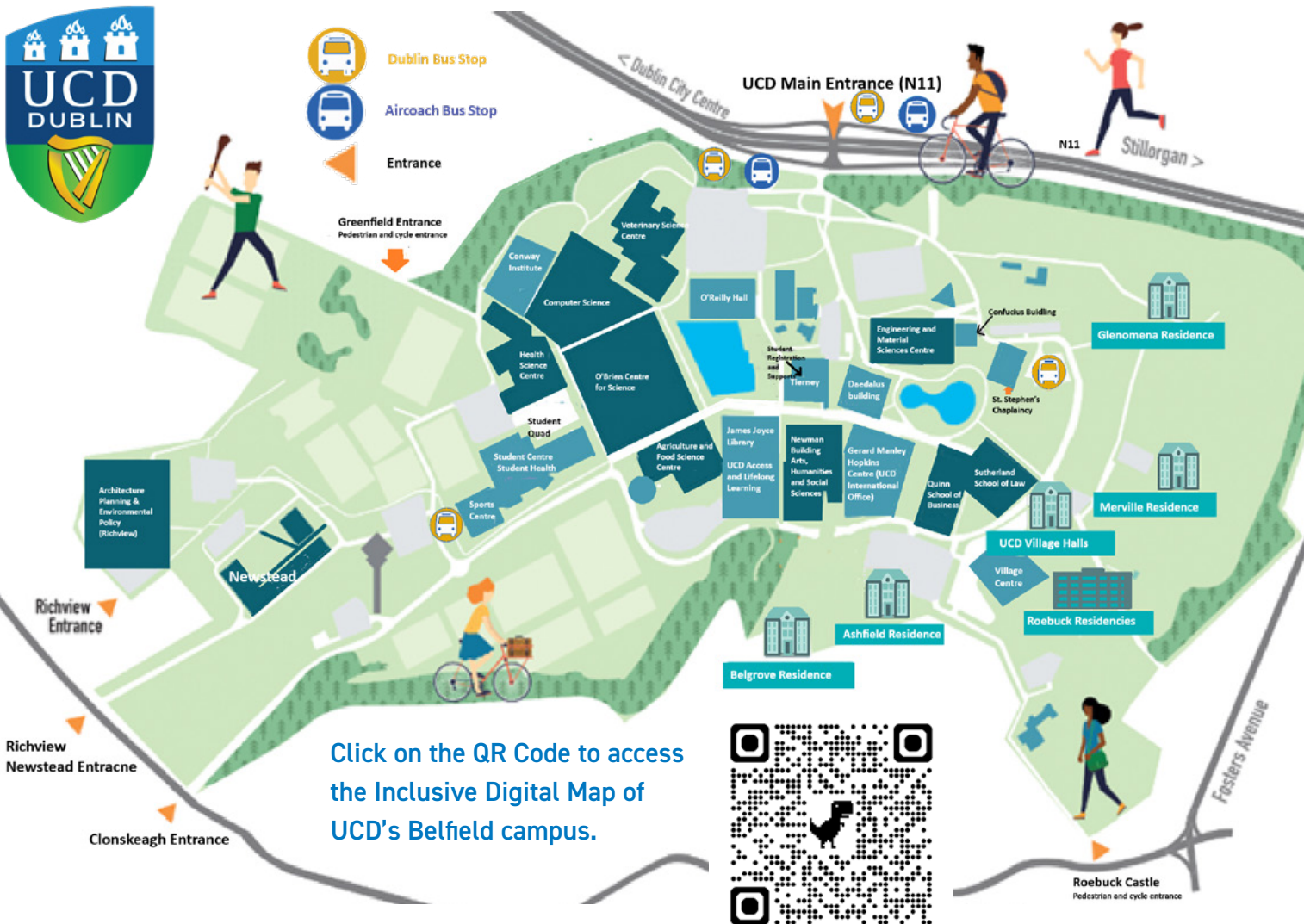

The areas of study include; Law, Sustainability, General Nursing, Computer Science, Sports and Exercise Management, Social Science, Psychology, Veterinary Nursing and Modern Languages and these programmes lead to courses in History, Literature, Philosophy, Psychology, Sociology, Political Science to mention just a few.

UCD Access and Lifelong Learning Centre (ALL) provides supports to assist you and guide you through your higher education journey. What you need to apply to UCD

You are eligible to apply for progression to UCD via the QQI FET Pathway if you have:

- 1 a linked QQI Level 5 or Level 6 major award.
- 2 the required QQI minor component combination.
- 3 a total of 120 component credits.
- 4 achieved the minimum minor component required result and QQI score.

Once you have the above you can apply through the CAO

Linked courses

It is essential that you research the requirements and process early if you are thinking of progressing to UCD using your QQI major award.

You are eligible to apply for the UCD programmes through the QQI FET pathway based on achieving a linked QQI Level 5 or 6 major award.

For example, a QQI major award in Business Administration (5M2468) is linked to Agricultural Science, Arts, Business & Law, Criminology and Psychology, Economics, Education with Gaeilge & Modern Languages, Humanities, Law, Modern Languages, Psychology, Social Science, Social Policy & Sociology and Sustainability which means that you may apply for these programmes with your Business Administration Award, but you are not eligible to apply for other programmes including Commerce, Veterinary Nursing, Food Science and Computer Science programmes with a Business Administration award.

Component combinations

After you know which QQI major award qualifies you for your chosen UCD programme, check that you have the right mix of component (minor) awards. There may be specific component requirements for each UCD programme.

Level 5 and level 6 major awards comprise eight minor component awards.

To illustrate, there are 40 QQI level 5 major awards and 22 QQI level 6 major awards linked to Economics. To be eligible to apply for Economics, Mathematics (5N1833) must be one of the components included in the QQI major award you are pursuing or, you must hold Grade H5 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics.

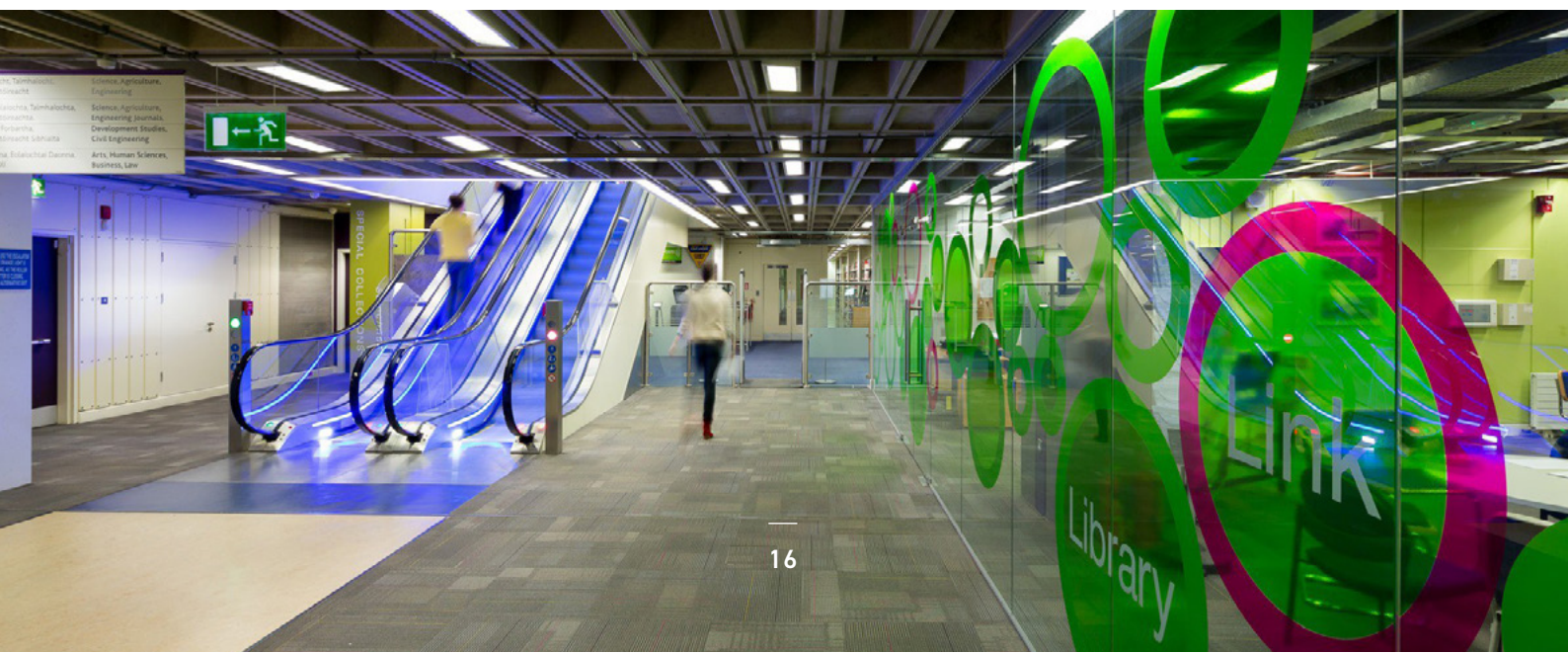
There are 36 QQI level 5 major awards and 21 QQI level 6 major awards which are linked to Education with Gaeilge & Modern Languages programme in UCD. To be eligible to apply, your QQI major award must comprise at least one language component or, you must hold Grade O6/H7 in a Leaving Certificate language.

The required components can be completed over multiple sittings leading to an appropriate major award.



Please note that due to the competitive nature of Sport, Health & Exercise Science, Sports & Exercise Management, Veterinary Nursing and all Nursing & Midwifery programmes, scores will only be calculated where the appropriate major award is presented in a single sitting, together with all the required components and results.

Your FET College Guidance Officer will also provide you with assistance.



Total credits and the scoring system

QQI major awards of less than 120 credits do not provide eligibility. Each QQI component has a credit value, typically between 15 and 30.

The QQI scores are determined by multiplying the credit value of each component by:

- 3 for a Distinction
- 2 for a Merit
- 1 for a Pass
- to a maximum of 120 credits.

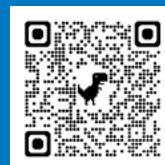
For example, an eligible FET learner applying for Science in UCD with a QQI Level 5 major award in Laboratory Techniques (5M3807) will have achieved the minimum requirements of five component distinctions including a distinction in Mathematics (5N1833) and a distinction in two of the following mandatory components: Laboratory Skills, Chemistry or Biology components. The QQI points calculation example below assumes that each module has a credit value of 15.

To calculate the QQI score points:

- Multiply the Credit Value (15) by 3 for a distinction, 2 for a merit or 1 for a pass for each module. The example calculation gives a total of 315.
- Multiply 315 by 13 and finally divide by 12 giving you a total score of 341 QQI points.

Minimum requirements

The QQI requirements for each programme outlined on the UCD QQI FET webpage are the basic minimum requirements you need to meet to apply. Having more than the basic minimum requirement is expedient. Places are given based on QQI points scores when there are more eligible applicants than available places. The CAO system ranks the QQI scores in descending order, starting from 390 and going downwards, and issues offers from the highest to the lowest QQI points scored. If, however, there are more eligible applicants than places then random selection applies.

The required points may vary each year depending on the number of applicants.

Based on figures 2024/2025 entry requirements more than the minimum requirement was needed to apply for Science; Computer Science*; Veterinary Nursing; Sport, Health and Exercise Science; General Nursing; Children's and General Nursing (Integrated); Midwifery; Law and Criminology with Psychology. The requirement was 390 QQI points (8 distinctions) despite the published minimum requirement being 292 QQI points (5 distinctions and 3 passes)

EXAMPLE

In 2026, the UCD will reserve 20 places on the Commerce programme for QQI FET applicants. If there are more than 20 eligible applicants who meet the basic minimum requirements, places will be offered to the top 20 eligible applicants on the list. The list is in descending points order, and applicants who have the same points are listed in random order.

If there are 10 applicants with 390 FET points and 15 applicants with 374 QQI points. The 20 places will be offered first to the 10 applicants with 390 points and then to the next 10 applicants, who have 374 points. Because there are 15 with 374 points random selection will apply.

If there are 10 applicants with 390 QQI points and then just 10 applicants with 374 QQI points. The 20 places will be offered to the top 20 eligible applicants. The applicants with 390 and 374 points are all offered a place and the next person on the waitlist will have the next score down. In this case, random selection will not be applied.

* Computer Science minimum requirement is 6 distinctions

Central Applications Office (CAO)

The Central Applications Office (CAO) is a centralised applications system that processes full-time undergraduate programme applications for the higher education institutes in the Republic of Ireland including UCD.

Applicants can use the CAO system to apply for undergraduate programmes across a mixture of universities and levels using a single application. The levels available on the CAO are Level 6 higher certificates, Level 7 ordinary degrees and Level 8 honours degrees.

Take your time when completing the application to ensure that you are picking the right course for you.

The CAO homepage provides you with a demonstration application to allow you to familiarise yourself with the process and each step before you apply.

QQI forwards all results achieved by applicants to the CAO. It is essential that your PPS number is inputted correctly on the CAO application form. If you omit it or if it is entered incorrectly, your results won't be forwarded on time.



Things to remember when completing your CAO application form.

- Consult the CAO Handbook which is available on the CAO website.
- List your programmes in order of preference.
- Think about your work experience and consider if you would like to continue this path or change direction.
- When deciding on programmes, check any minimum entry requirements, deadlines, restrictions and supplementary information.
- Pay attention to CAO communications, deadlines and verify your application details. If you do not receive a Statement by June 1st, contact the CAO immediately.

What will going to UCD cost me?

Attending a fulltime third-level course in UCD can be financially challenging. Listed below are the main fees for which you, as a UCD student, may be liable.



1. Programme Course Fee

The good news is that most UCD undergraduate students do not have to pay tuition fees. Under the terms of the Free Fees Initiative, the Department of Further and Higher Education pays the fees to the colleges.

The criteria for eligibility for the Free Fees Initiative are:

- You must have been living in an EEA member state, Switzerland or United Kingdom (UK) for at least 3 of the 5 years before starting your course.
- You must be one of the following, or have been granted one of the following:
 - A citizen of an EEA member state, Switzerland or the UK.
 - Have refugee status, family members of refugees, those with leave to remain, and/or international protection.
- You must be starting a full-time undergraduate course for the first time. However, you may also qualify for free fees if you:
 - Already hold a Level 6 or a Level 7 qualification and are progressing to a Level 8 qualification on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ), or
 - If you attended a course before but didn't finish it, you can return to study an approved course at the same level. This is possible after a break of at least 3 years.

2. Student Contribution

The Student Contribution or registration fee covers student services and examinations. The maximum rate of the UCD student contribution for the academic year 2025-2026 is €3,000.

If you are receiving the Back to Education Allowance (BTEA), you may be exempt from paying the student contribution levy.

If you are awarded a SUSI grant your Student Contribution may be covered by the SUSI grant.

3. Student Centre Levy

All students must pay the Student Centre Levy. This levy was €254 in 2024/25. It supports the provision of facilities, clubs and societies and it also grants you access to two gyms and over 100 fitness classes per week at UCD Sport & Fitness.

National grants, allowances and scholarships for full-time students

SUSI Grant

SUSI (Student Universal Support Ireland) provides financial support to eligible students. There are two elements to the student grant – a maintenance grant (contribution towards living costs) and a fee grant (covering all or part of the student contribution fee plus the costs of essential field trips).



The grant is means-tested, based on your family's gross income for the previous full tax year, so for those entering university in 2026, the income for 2025 tax year will be assessment.

If a family has more than one child in college at the same time, the reckonable income limits are increased. The distance a person normally lives from the college is also a factor in how much an individual is eligible to receive. Go to the [SUSI website](#) or scan the QR Code for more information and access to an eligibility reckoner.

Back to Education Allowance (BTEA)

If you are unemployed, a lone parent, or you are receiving a disability allowance from the Department of Social Protection, you may be able to participate in third level education programme and receive a Back to Education Allowance (BTEA).



It is important to note that you cannot be in receipt of both the BTEA and the maintenance component of a student grant. In order to receive the BTEA, you must accept your place on a full-time course, and then notify the Department of Social Protection by completing the BTEA application form.

Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)

UCD FET students may be eligible for HEAR Supports up until the age of 23. To qualify for HEAR, you must meet certain indicators or criteria related to your financial, social and economic circumstances, listed below:

- Low Income
- Medical card
- Means tested Social welfare payments
- Socio-economic group
- DEIS school
- Living in an area of disadvantage or experienced homelessness in the last two years



If eligible, UCD QQI FET students may avail of HEAR supports, the most relevant support being access to the HEAR Support Fund. Find out more about the [HEAR Support Fund](#) by scanning the QR code

Higher Education Scholarships for Adult Learners

Uversity is a registered charity that grants Higher Education Scholarships to adult learners seeking to unlock their potential and realise their academic, personal and professional ambitions.

Uversity's Scholarships help to alleviate the financial barriers that may be preventing students, aged 23 and over, from progressing to Higher Education. The [Uversity website](#) provides more information or scan the QR Code.



UCD scholarship and bursary funding for full-time students

The scholarships and bursaries listed below do not impact on your SUSI grant as they are not considered reckonable income in the SUSI eligibility calculations. All of the scholarships require that you satisfy one of the specific eligibility criteria which include: Student with a disability, first-time mature student, member of the Traveller community, Further Education award holder, lone parent who is in receipt of a means- tested social welfare payment, a member of an ethnic minority, a refugee, an international protection applicant with leave to remain, a student who has successfully completed a UCD Access Programme.



There may be variations in eligibility criteria for some of the scholarships listed below so it is important to consult the [UCD ALL Financial Supports](#) or scan the QR Code or email all@ucd.ie for further information.

Full-time Undergraduate Students	
Cothrom na Féinne	For incoming first-year students. There are over 145 Cothrom Na Féinne Scholarships that have a value of €1,500/€2,500 per year
1916 Bursary	For incoming first-year students. It has a value of between €2,000 and €5,000 per annum for the duration of your studies. You will also be able to receive the bursary if you progress to a postgraduate programme. The 1916 Bursary is awarded to applicants that present the greatest need.
NUI Scholarship	One-time payment for incoming students with physical and sensory disabilities.
Think Again	A scholarship for women aged 23 and over living in a low income household. It may cover living costs, as well as a range of other vital supports such as career and personal development. An awardee may secure up to €7,000 per student per year of study.
Sanctuary Programme	For incoming students who are refugees, international protection applicants, and those with humanitarian leave to remain.

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National scholarship and bursary funding and UCD school specific scholarships

The student support fund provides funding for students who are on full time programmes	
<u>Student Assistance Fund</u>	Means-tested annual funding for Irish/EU students on full-time programmes. Students can get assistance towards rent, medical bills, food etc. Students apply in October, it's a once-off payment during the year.
<u>Parenting Support Fund</u>	Means-tested annual funding for Irish/EU students who are parenting.

Funding from charitable organisations

The SVP Education and Training Bursary Fund has been established to support students of all ages who may financially struggle to access or stay in third level education and training programmes. Go to the [Society of St Vincent De Paul website](#) or scan the QR code.



UCD school specific scholarship

Specific Schools in UCD may have scholarships available for students who satisfy specific criteria. For example, the UCD Lochlann Quinn School of Business awards the KPMG Denis O'Connor Memorial scholarships. These scholarships are designed for promising students whose circumstances may present challenges towards fully accessing and availing of college opportunities. Each year, four scholarships are awarded based on merit, achievement and enabling impact. Overall, the programme's goal is to assist scholars to thrive in their college experience and to widen and deepen participation across the learning community.



Part-time courses and funding

You may feel that you do not want to start a full-time course yet. There are a number of part-time courses available in UCD which will give you a taste of UCD.

Access courses

The UCD Access courses are ideal if you want to study an undergraduate degree but don't quite feel ready or don't fully meet the admission requirements. These courses are designed to help you find your feet, explore subject choices, and develop your study skills before you take that next step. UCD offers a range of Access options depending on what you hope to study and the time you can commit.

Open Learning Pathways

Open Learning is UCD's most flexible part-time study option. You can build your own timetable, choosing from more than 450 modules taken directly from UCD undergraduate degrees. This is an excellent way to try out the university experience.



There are two National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) awards available through Open Learning: a 30 credit (6 modules) NFQ Level 7 Certificate, or a 60 credit (12 modules) NFQ Level 7 Diploma. Students may apply for a pathway into 17 UCD degree programmes through Open Learning.

Student Leap Card

The Student Leap card is available for students in full-time education who are either 16 -18 years of age or years and above. This allows for 50 per cent fare reductions on Bus Éireann, Dublin Bus, Iarnród



Éireann (including the Dart), Go-Ahead Ireland, Luas, and participating TFI Local Link services.

A daily and weekly cap has been put on the amount you can spend while using your Leap Card. Once you hit the cap, you travel free for the rest of the day or week.



Cycling

For those who like to cycle, UCD Bikes have a Buy Back Scheme offering to buy back any bike it has sold to a student for up to 50% of the purchase price. Scan the QR Code to find out more information.



Dublin Bikes provides a service where an annual student subscription of €20 enables you to use the bikes for free for the first 30 minutes of every journey. After this, rental charges apply in accordance with the company's fees structure.

Cook at home

Make a list of grocery items every week and stick to it when you are shopping. Cook in bulk and freeze. Make and bring your own lunch to campus. Bring a flask.

Buy second-hand books

Textbooks can be expensive but if you shop around, you can save yourself a lot of money. Once you have your essential reading list, take a look at your college website and campus noticeboards to see whether anyone is selling the books you need. If you don't need a copy of your own, your college library might also have some of your required textbooks. It is also worth looking online to see whether any of your required books are available in free PDF format.

Students who enter UCD through the QQI FET Pathway and have a disability are eligible for all of the disability supports available at UCD.

UCD students with a disability or significant ongoing illness have the opportunity to receive relevant reasonable accommodations or supports. Documentation confirming the disability or significant ongoing illness is required in order to receive supports. These supports are related to the student's needs and may include academic supports such as awareness supports for your lecturers and/or exam supports such as extra time for exams. Each year you are registered as a UCD student your disability supports will roll over, there is no need to have an annual Needs Assessment.

Examples of classroom accommodations used by students in UCD include:

- Use of assistive technology such as a recording device in lectures, if eligible.
- Provision of an Irish Sign Language (ISL) Interpreter and/or Note Taker for Deaf students.
- Provision of required reading in an alternative format for blind or visually impaired students.
- The student's lecturer is made aware of their disability, if desired.

Assistive Technology

Assistive Technology (AT) is a range of tools that make learning more accessible. This includes, for example, software that helps with spelling and grammar, digital pens or software for recording lectures, adapted tools for those with visual or hearing impairments, and alternative inputs for students with mobility issues.

UCD Access & Lifelong Learning has an Assistive Technology Specialist who can provide technology and training to students who avail of disability support.

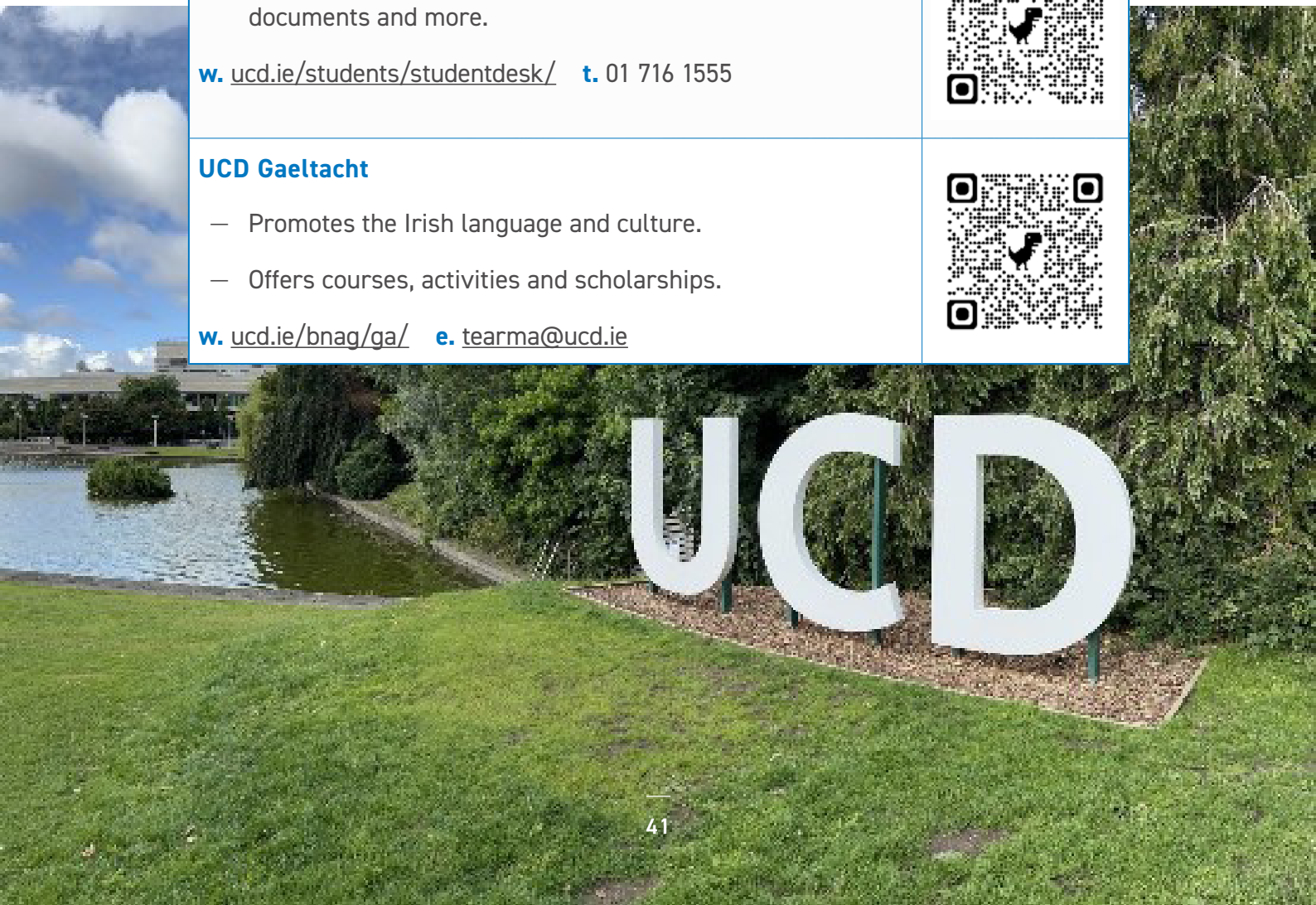
