In 2024, UCD and the Creative Futures academy opened Trapdoor, a state-ofthe-art blackbox theatre and performance space in the Newman Building. Located in the original DramSoc theatre, Trapdoor is dedicated to nurturing Ireland's next generation of creative talent in the areas of creativity and performance. The space caters to a variety of flexible stage and classroom configurations, and audience interactions, making it the ideal environment for developing student's creative and performing talents. Trapdoor also has a 144-seated theatre with professional grade lighting, visual and audio sound system. Trapdoor was developed alongside an experimental creative arts and performance media lab, which will provide students the opportunity to develop skills in digital content creation, production, design, and cultivate student talent in the best way possible - learning by doing.



THE UNESCO NATIONAL FOLKLORE COLLECTION

One of the world's largest archives of oral tradition and vernacular culture, the UNESCO National Folklore Collection is committed to documenting the traditions of communities across Ireland as well as supporting ongoing research through its substantial collection of international journals, audio visual and comparative source materials in folkloristics and ethnology.

MUSEUM OF LITERATURE IRELAND (MoLI)

MoLI is Dublin's newest cultural institution and can be found in the heart of the city, at UCD's Newman House on St Stephen's Green. The museum celebrates the diversity of Irish writing, past and present, with a rich programme of exhibitions and events. The life and work of James Joyce, our renowned alumnus, is the centrepiece of this museum, which is a partnership between UCD and the National Library of Ireland.





CLASSICAL MUSEUM

At the heart of teaching and research in the School of Classics, this expansive and active research space houses the largest collection of Classical antiquities on display in Ireland. Artefacts include ceramics, inscriptions, glass and coins from Greece, Cyprus, Rome and Egypt, as well as early replicas of Aegean Bronze Age material.

UCD ARCHIVES

UCD Archives is an important repository of political and cultural records extending from the Middle Ages to the present. The archives include the private papers of Eamon De Valera, Conor Cruise O'Brien and John A. Costello, and provide a wealth of resources about key events in Irish history, such as the Anglo-Irish Treaty 1921 and records of Dáil debates since its inception.

UCD SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

These collections span printed materials, manuscripts and archival material dating from the 15th century onwards. With an emphasis on historical literature, Celtic Studies and Irish language material, the repository includes the Franciscan Collection of 5000 early printed books; the Curran Collection of early 20th-century Irish Literature in English, and the papers of Irish writers such as Patrick Kavanagh and Edna O'Brien. UCD Special Collections also hosts the Irish Poetry Reading Archive.

APPLICATIONS AND ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The normal requirement for entry to a taught masters degree programme at UCD is a secondclass honours degree in a relevant subject. However prospective applicants should check the specific requirements of their preferred degree, since some may stipulate a higher standard for entry. Applicants who do not meet these conditions may, in some cases, be eligible for a place on a year-long qualifying course. Some degrees also offer pathway programmes. If English is not your first language, you will need a minimum IELTS score of 6.5 (with no component below 6.0), or equivalent, to be considered for postgraduate study at UCD; some programmes have higher language requirements.

RESEARCH MASTERS

RESEARCH DEGREES

Students embarking on research degrees at UCD will have direct access to our extensive range of unique literary, historical and cultural resources. The UCD Cultural Heritage collections, including UCD Special Collections, **UCD Archives and the National Folklore** Collection, are rich repositories of primary source material which form the basis of original research at doctoral and postdoctoral level. The collections include: the literary archives of Patrick Kavanagh, Edna O'Brien, Mary Lavin and Frank McGuinness, the papers of major figures in the foundation of the Irish State such as Eamon De Valera, Kevin Barry, Frank Aiken, W.T. Cosgrave, Ernie O'Malley, Desmond and Mabel Fitzgerald, the early printed books and manuscripts of the Irish Franciscans, a Victorian science library and the manuscripts, interviews and photographic collections of the National Folklore Commission. These collections are complemented by the expertise of the academic staff across the College of Arts and Humanities.


RESEARCH MASTERS

A Research Masters is a research degree carried out over 3-6 trimesters full time (1 to 2 years) or 5-9 trimesters part time (15 months to 3 years). A student wishing to transfer to the PhD programme may do so after one year, subject to a formal evaluation process.

PHD

A PhD combines academic research with the opportunity to develop important transferable skills that will significantly enhance your academic profile and career prospects. Research is carried out in two stages under the supervision of one or more academics with expertise in the field. The period of registration is normally 3-4 years for full-time students and 5-6 years for students registered on a part-time basis. Research and professional development training are integral to the doctoral programme. We offer a portfolio of support services to PhD candidates including graduate teaching opportunities, scholarships and competitive research enhancement funding. Many of our students compete successfully for prestigious scholarship schemes such as those sponsored by the Irish Research Council.






ACADEMIC RESEARCH STRATEGY



(with CNN Academy)

OVERVIEW

The CNN Academy/UCD Clinton Institute MA in Journalism and International Affairs is a one-year programme that combines practical training in audio, video, digital, and social storytelling with academic expertise in international affairs. This is the first English-language Masters programme CNN has co-designed in collaboration with a university partner, combining journalistic and academic excellence in an innovative curriculum that is challenging and employment-orientated. The programme will equip new generations of journalists to report on critical global issues of the day, from climate change, to human rights to terrorism. It will appeal to and reward those with a passion to not only understand the world but explain it in ways that are informative and transformative.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The syllabus is co-created and delivered by CNN Academy and UCD Clinton Institute, connecting the classroom to the newsroom, affording direct collaboration with the news industry and access to best practices in cross-platform journalism and news production. Throughout the programme, students will learn about approaches to storytelling, international standards and ethics in journalism, and verification techniques. Each week, students will tackle key subject areas through modules at the Clinton Institute that draw on the CNN Academy Hub e-learning platform. CNN journalists, editors and producers will participate via live interactive and in-person seminars and also provide hands-on audio, video and digital production training at UCD Clinton Institute to equip the students with the tools they need to tangibly apply the media lessons they are learning.

CNN Academy News Simulation Week: Students will have an opportunity to take part in CNN simulation week in the UAE. This is not a mandatory part of the programme. Full information available on www.ucdclinton.ie

The practical training components supported by CNN will be complemented by the Clinton Institute's academic expertise in the field to provide core modules in research skills, international journalism, new media and international conflict, cybersecurity and political communications.

MA American Politics & Foreign Policy

OVERVIEW

The United States arguably remains the most influential country in the world. However, a number of challenges in recent years have called into question the sustainability of American leadership abroad and prosperity at home. This MA allows students to explore in depth both US foreign and domestic politics. During the year you will study US relations with key regions of the world. You will also discuss issues of terrorism, nuclear proliferation, the global economy, and climate change to name a few. Moreover, you will gain an extensive knowledge of the impact of emerging technologies, such as cyber and digital technologies, on international relations and the US place in the world. Race, gender, elections, and political polarisation will also be addressed. This academic programme is also suited to practitioners/professionals in a related field who wish to gain a broader understanding of processes, policies, and outcomes in the area of American politics and foreign policy, both domestically and within the context of international affairs.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The programme is composed of 90 credits, 60 of which come from weekly small class seminars and the remaining 30 from a dissertation. Students take 50 credits of core modules taught at the UCD Clinton Institute and the remaining credits are taken from a list of optional modules from a range of Arts and Humanities and Social Sciences subjects. Students are taught in small group seminars on a weekly basis.

FACILITIES AND RESOURCES

Classes are intentionally kept small. This is to encourage students to be active, motivated, and autonomous learners who have a critical and reflective approach to the subject. We aim to provide a learning environment that will encourage students to think critically about policy and the ideas that shape it, both individually and as part of a group. As a result of this approach to learning, the programme uses teaching, learning, and assessment approaches such as the drafting of policy memoranda, one-on-one advising, small group activities, presentations, seminar discussions, policy analysis, and internships. Moreover, small student cohorts allow for tutors being regularly available for meetings with individual students. In addition to classes, students are encouraged to attend a variety of events organised by the Clinton Institute.

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MA Media & International Conflict

OVERVIEW

This programme is designed to enable students to develop an understanding of the ways in which media interacts with war, conflict and security in international contexts. The course provides an interdisciplinary approach that considers both cultural and political dimensions of media responses to international conflict. Students will focus on issues such as: public diplomacy and soft power, the role of new media in perceptions of conflict, the production, circulation and reception of imagery of conflict, and the effects of news reporting on government policy and NGO activity.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The programme is composed of 90 credits, 60 of which come from weekly small class seminars and the remaining 30 from a dissertation. Students take 50 credits of core modules taught at the Institute and the remaining credits are taken from a list of optional modules. Students are taught in small seminar classes.

MA Art History, Collections & Curating

OVERVIEW

The MA in Art History, Collections and Curating offers advanced postgraduate training in the history of art, with a special focus on the theories and practices of curating and collecting. It offers the opportunity to hone skills in the interpretation, critique and analysis of works of art and architecture, and of visual and material cultures, developing the knowledge and capacity to pursue future careers in academia, research, writing and curatorship.

Combining academic scholarship with an introduction to curation in museums and galleries, both public and private, students will benefit from our School's extensive partnerships with local, regional and national cultural institutions while gaining first-hand exposure to advanced, active research in art history. Full-Time and Part-Time options are available.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

You will study a mixture of methodological and historical modules. There is a field trip to a major European city during the Spring trimester, focusing on national institutions and collections. A thesis module provides scope for research into areas of study not included in the taught programme, including topics that have a specific relevance for students' own intellectual interests.

FACILITIES AND RESOURCES

Class time is divided between UCD Belfield Campus, Newman House in St Stephen's Green (the historic home of the university), and in major cultural institutions across the city, including the National Gallery of Ireland, the Irish Museum of Modern Art and the Royal Hibernian Academy. The Managing Collections module includes work experience with the Office of Public Works art and heritage collections. The School also has its own designated reference libraries and study spaces, including the Françoise Henry Reading Room and the Rosemarie Mulcahy Seminar Room, which houses a specialist library devoted to Spanish art.

MA Cultural Policy & Arts Management

OVERVIEW

The MA Cultural Policy & Arts Management is aimed at graduate students and experienced cultural sector practitioners seeking the skills to be effective managers and leaders in the arts and heritage fields. Lectures are carried out in small seminar rooms where active participation in debate with lecturers and guest lecturers are encouraged. The critical and practical content of the programme challenges students to analyse the conceptual frameworks and cultural contexts that generate cultural policies, while acquiring the skills to be effective leaders and managers in the cultural field. The competencies acquired provide graduates with an excellent multi-disciplinary qualification that is highly regarded among sectoral employers, in Ireland and internationally.

MA and MFA Creative Writing

OVERVIEW

UCD offers an MA and an MFA in Creative Writing. The MA is suitable for students who are developing a serious writing practice, exploring a range of genres, open to experiment and play as readers and writers of poetry, fiction of all kinds and creative non-fiction. We usually take around 12 students per year. The MFA is for students who have an established writing practice, usually a relevant academic or professional background, and who hope to make significant progress with a novel, short story collection or work of creative non-fiction. MFA students participate in workshops during the teaching terms and work one-to-one with a supervisor on a 50,000 word project in the spring and summer. We usually take around 6 MFA students per year. We encourage and support our MA and MFA students in participating in a writing community that thrives long after graduation. The UCD Writers in Conversation events, taking place approximately monthly, give current and recent students regular meetings with guest writers, each other and UCD staff.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

Seminars, workshops and supervision meetings aim to provide committed writers with taught classes on the theory and practices of writing. We work on voice, structure and other important aspects of craft throughout the year.

As a participant on the MA or MFA programme you will:

- be taught by experienced, published writers
- learn how to produce and develop new ideas for your own writing
- gain skills in editing and revising
- explore the archives of some of the world's leading writers in the Special Collections held in UCD
- develop a portfolio of work in your own chosen genre

MA Gender, Sexuality & Culture

OVERVIEW

The MA in Gender, Sexuality & Culture is a dynamic, multi-disciplinary programme designed for students with a strong interest in exploring gender and sexuality in literary and cultural production and representation. Our programme attracts students from all over the world and from a wide range of disciplines and backgrounds. Drawing on the internationally recognised expertise in gender and sexuality studies from across the Humanities and Social Sciences in UCD, we provide our students with a rigorous training in the analysis of gender and sexuality in literature, film, television, media, performance, visual culture, digital culture and more. Students will explore issues of gender and sexuality with specific attention to race, class, migration and citizenship within an intersectional feminist framework.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The MA consists of a combination of taught modules delivered in the form of seminar classes, and supervised individual research projects in the form of the dissertation. Assessment is through a combination of research dissertation, research essay, class presentation, short assignments and peer review exercises. The supervised dissertation gives you the unique opportunity to work closely on a topic of your choosing with published experts in your field of specialisation. All students take the core module in Theories of Gender & Sexuality, and choose from a variety of option modules according to your interests.

Led by our world-class researchers and teachers, the MA in Literature & Culture combines a foundation in critical methods and literary and cultural studies with wide-ranging options for specialist study. On this course, you will enhance your understanding of the rich and complex heritages of the field, hone your research and writing skills and be part of our vibrant postgraduate community, which hosts a theory reading group, a reading group, and an active link to the interdisciplinary programmes at the Humanities Institute. 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MA Theatre Practice

OVERVIEW

The MA in Theatre Practice is offered by UCD in partnership with the Gaiety School of Acting and aims to create future leaders in the theatre industry who have an all-round skills base in theatre practice. The programme brings together UCD's rigorous academic scholarship and the Gaiety School of Acting's expertise in theatre practice and production to provide an inspiring and challenging environment. 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MA Writing for Stage & Screen

OVERVIEW

Today, as never before, writers are moving between different media — stage, television, film and online. In recognition of such fluidity and range of outlets, and the attendant opportunities, this MA programme encourages participants to develop their own work across diverse platforms – initially working on the fundamentals of one foundational genre - drama - before adapting their stage writing to more visually dominant forms. During the module we focus on the commonalities across dialogue-based narratives, and how writers, beginning with this primary genre can learn basic skills which transfer into onscreen storytelling. Above all, we seek to equip writers with the tools and confidence to work as and when the openings occur, to have the flexibility to move between forms, and even between fiction and non-fiction, as desired. The digital revolution has democratised creativity, there are openings for skilled and determined writers as never before, and participants should be well-placed in a very competitive industry to take advantage of this fact.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

Students complete a number of modules dedicated to writing for Stage and Screen. Students will also take part in seminars, small group discussions and one on one sessions. Students will end their studies with a final creative project that will be either a film or a play. All work will be supported by professionals in their individual fields. Professional contributors over the past number of years include Conor McPherson, Frank McGuinness, and more recently Mark O'Halloran, Mark Doherty, Rachel Fehily, Declan Hughes, Sophie Motley and Noelia Ruiz.

MA Archives & Records Management

OVERVIEW

The MA Archives & Records Management trains students to select, curate and ensure access to the historic and future memory contained in records. It is aimed at graduates who wish to acquire the theoretical knowledge and practical skills to enable them to ethically manage records and archives in all formats, from medieval manuscripts to born digital records. The programme is based on the conception of the record-keeper as a reflective professional, who is informed in terms of adherence to international best practice, creative in the delivery of services, sensitive to cultural difference, and dynamic in relation to technological change. The MA Archives & Records Management programme in UCD has long-standing professional accreditation by the Archives and Records Association UK and Ireland. This accreditation ensures that this qualification is recognised globally as being of the highest standard.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The MA consists of a number of taught modules, each of which is worth 5 or 10 credits, and a dissertation worth 30 credits. Core modules provide students with the fundamental knowledge, competencies and skills relevant to a career in archives and records management. Optional modules afford students the opportunity to specialise in areas such as digital curation and palaeography. Assessment is based on enabling students to complete assignments, which simulate the work of the professional record-keeper. An engagement with the theory behind contemporary practice is encouraged through presentations, essays and a minor research dissertation.

MA European History (UNICA)

OVERVIEW

The MA European History (UNICA) is a stimulating two-year interdisciplinary, comparative Master's programme which offers the choice between partner universities in different European capitals – Dublin, Berlin, Paris, Rome, Oslo, and Vienna. Students begin their programme at UCD and then can study at one of the partner universities, before returning to UCD to undertake the dissertation. This diverse programme focuses on the comparative analysis of European history and students will develop the ability to understand historical problems in a comparative framework. The programme is taught in English, so that all partner universities offer some modules in English. It is also possible to take modules in the local language. This programme provides excellent preparation for students wishing to pursue a PhD in European history and equips students with a wide range of skills in the international jobs market.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

Over the course of the two year programme, students have the opportunity to study at leading European universities, developing an understanding of different historiographical and methodological approaches, appreciating the value of comparative approaches to European history, and developing linguistic and other skills necessary for more advanced graduate study. Modules cover topics such as the history of international relations, political violence, comparative revolutions, Communism, European imperialism, gender in modern history, and the history of science and technology.

The MA is also offered as a part-time programme over two years.

Our course includes training in methodology and research, as well as cutting edge seminar courses on subjects like Gender, Empires and Imperialism, War and Political Violence (including terrorism, genocide and mass violence), Medicine, Religion, Revolution, Nationalism and Globalisation. Every student is free to choose their own degree pathway and the modules on offer include courses in medieval, early-modern and modern history. Our geographical expertise covers most of the world. You will complete the programme with a 15,000 word dissertation, carefully supervised by one of our experts. This piece of independent and original historical research is your chance to demonstrate your ability to undertake a substantial piece of original research. You will have the chance to present your research to our staff and your peers in a friendly environment at our annual MA conference.

MA History of Welfare & Medicine in Society

OVERVIEW

The UCD MA in History of Welfare & Medicine in Society is a one-year taught postgraduate degree programme. It introduces students to the advanced study of the history of medicine and welfare, and equips them with the conceptual and practical skills to carry out independent historical research. Students on the MA are encouraged to engage with a range of concepts, and to place developments within medical knowledge, theory and practice in a broad social and cultural framework. The MA is suitable for students who have previously studied history, as well as for graduates of related subjects in the humanities and social sciences. It is also popular among health-care professionals keen to understand historical contexts that shaped current practices and systems. The MA is also offered as a part-time programme over two years.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

All of our teaching at postgraduate level consists of seminar style debates led by world-class researchers. Our course includes training in methodology and research, as well as seminars on gender, medicine and race, colonial medicine, war and medicine; disease and pandemics; disability; global health; activism and medicine; medical racism; institutional medical violence, and medical politics. 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MA International War Studies

OVERVIEW

The Dual MA in International War Studies will be offered by University College Dublin and the University of Potsdam, where the only Chair of Military History in Germany is based. Students will spend one academic year in each institution. The MA will enable students to experience two different academic structures (in Germany and Ireland), taking advantage of the rich cultural offerings and research facilities in Dublin, Potsdam and nearby Berlin. The programme will be fully taught in English, however students are encouraged to learn an additional language to strengthen their international profile. It will enable students to acquire a comprehensive and advanced knowledge of the main areas of the history of war in the twentieth century. All modules will be delivered by leading experts in the field, ensuring research led teaching throughout the course.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

Students will take a number of core modules offered by the University of Potsdam and UCD. A variety of assessment experiences allows students to develop their critical thinking and analytical skills. Over the course of the programme they will experience formative assessment through essays, presentations and work-based projects. Students will have an opportunity to engage in a work placement, providing them with practical experience outside the academic world. Students will also have the chance to pursue their own research interests by undertaking an end of year dissertation under the supervision of a staff mentor.

MA Irish History

OVERVIEW

UCD's dynamic School of History, the largest in the country, has long played a vital role in leading national debate and research on the evolution of Irish society, culture and politics. This MA enables students to work closely with some of the country's most renowned historians of Ireland to continue the tradition of providing context, insight and originality in the research of Irish history and its communication to a wide audience. Our teaching is informed by a global perspective, situating events in Ireland in an international and comparative context. UCD faculty have diverse research interests and our module choices reflect this, ranging from the mediaeval to the modern period and thematically across histories of religion, the environment, medicine and deviancy, gender and war, and twentieth century Irish society and politics.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The MA in Irish History consists of a mix of core modules focused on historiography and dissemination, three options and a 15,000 word dissertation. Our classes are taught in small seminars with an emphasis on participation and debate. There is a strong emphasis on primary research and you will become familiar with the extensive Irish history collections in UCD Archives and UCD Library. There is a lively and dynamic research culture in UCD and students are encouraged to attend our seminar series in gender history, war studies, global history, the Mícheál Ó Cléirigh Institute for the Study of Irish History and Civilisation seminars, and the Centre for the History of Medicine in Ireland seminars. You will also have the opportunity to present your research to our staff and your peers in a friendly environment at our annual MA conference.

MA Public History

OVERVIEW

The MA Public History draws upon the established strength and expertise of the UCD School of History. Within this programme you will work closely with historians who are active in the practice of public history and commemorations. This course offers you the opportunity to build a tailored skillset that will allow you to disseminate history across multiple media platforms. You will consider how history can be used to inform public discourse and shape policy in culture, education, politics, and the media. Through a mix of academic and practical modules, you will be guided through the theory and application of public history. The course also offers the opportunity for students to undertake relevant work experience in diverse settings including media, policy, research, and cultural institutions.

The wide selection of dedicated postgraduate option modules allow the student to analyse historical problems in a comparative framework, while the dissertation module allows the student to develop their own personal research specialisation in any area of history working with UCD faculty.



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MA Irish Folklore & Ethnology

OVERVIEW

The MA Irish Folklore & Ethnology is a recently established programme which offers students the chance to acquire in-depth knowledge of a unique and vibrant aspect of Irish culture – that of oral tradition and folklore, representing the history and heritage of Ireland at vernacular level. Modules are available on a wide range of topics, including research theories, the study of oral narrative (storytelling), traditional music and song, fieldwork and archival methods, social tradition, popular belief systems, material culture, folk medicine, and Irish and European ethnology. The programme also offers students a chance to complete an internship in a related cultural institute (subject to availability), or to write a Masters thesis.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

This programme involves two core modules, Advanced Research I and II, both of them taught modules which provide students with a grounding in the methodologies, practicalities and theoretical frameworks of Folkloristics and Folklore Studies. Students will either complete a Masters thesis under the guidance of a member of the teaching staff in Irish Folklore & Ethnology, or undertake a Work Placement (subject to availability) with the National Folklore Collection or the Irish Traditional Music Archive.

MA Irish Studies

OVERVIEW

The MA Irish Studies is an interdisciplinary programme that examines the variety and diversity of Irish history, society and cultural practice. It asks a series of questions about Ireland and Irishness, including how did the Irish come to be the way they are, and to what extent are they different from other nations? How has Irish identity changed over time? What are the causes of this process? This MA introduces students to a wide range of sources and resources, issues and debates about the many-faceted experiences of the people who have lived in Ireland from the earliest times to the present. You will avail of UCD's unrivalled expertise in many fields related to Irish Studies. Being in Dublin naturally also provides students with easy access to many of Ireland's key cultural institutions and libraries. This Master's Degree can also be undertaken part-time.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

All students participate in two interdisciplinary Irish Studies modules which serve as the core of the programme. These introduce students to the relevant resources at their disposal and provide the small-group teaching and personalised supervision that help them to thrive at graduate level. MA sa Nua-Ghaeilge

OVERVIEW

The MA sa Nua-Ghaeilge is for graduates of Modern Irish and graduates of cognate disciplines. It aims to promote and preserve the Irish language, literature and culture, and emphasise their importance for Irish society and European identity. It prepares students for a broad range of career paths, including education in Ireland and abroad, public service, editing and publishing, and further academic research. Students develop communicative, analytical and research skills throughout the programme. They will develop advanced linguistic skills in Irish and deepen their knowledge of Irish-language literature, culture and history.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

All teaching and communication is conducted through the medium of Irish and in small groups. Students must take Teanga na Gaeilge IV, a core module which focuses on: mastering accurate spoken and written Irish in both academic and professional contexts; writing analytical essays; having the ability to give interviews in broadcast and print media; debate and analyse current affairs and academic topics.

Option modules may be chosen from two categories - Literature, and Language and Culture. While students are advised to have chosen a topic for their minor thesis (12,000-15,000 words) by December of the relevant academic year, they are not expected to devote their full attention to it until after they have completed their examinations in the taught modules in trimesters 1 and 2.

MA Scríobh agus Cumarsáid na Gaeilge

OVERVIEW

This course is designed for students with a degree in Irish who wish to bring their language skills to the next level and prepare for careers in areas such as translation, legal translation, editing, publishing and journalism, for example. This course is also suitable for graduates from other areas who have experience of working through Irish and who have a high standard of written and spoken Irish. Students of this course may choose from a selection of modules focused on grammar and language accuracy, creative writing, media studies, translation and legal translation, and are offered the chance to complete an internship/work placement or undertake a research/translation project as part of their summer trimester. Students of this course will graduate with effective communication and analytical skills to prepare them for a variety of career paths, including careers in education, research/academia, public service (both in Ireland and Europe), translation, editing and the media, among others.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

A series of seminars delivered by guest lecturers introduces students to current research by experts in their fields. Students are encouraged to make use of digital archive resources in their research. Learning and assessment approaches include oral, written and aural examinations, peer assessment, project work, essays, presentations, seminars, work placements and research dissertation. The work placements provide opportunities for students to engage with the Irish language in a professional capacity in national and European organisations.

MA Linguistics & Applied Linguistics

OVERVIEW

The MA in Linguistics and Applied Linguistics introduces students to current research approaches, methods, and theories in core areas of Linguistics. Students acquire fundamental skills in linguistic analysis and its effective application to a wide range of real-life language-based phenomena. The programme develops critical transferable skills such as academic communication, group learning and project design. It nurtures essential academic values such as systematic and empirically based investigation, critical reflection, interdisciplinarity and enquiry-based learning. A flexible learning environment is provided that encourages students to identify and pursue their own research interests. Modules apply a range of teaching and learning approaches and are taught by experienced and accessible academic staff.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

Students take modules in the core areas of Syntax, Phonology, Sociolinguistics and Corpus Linguistics along with modules developing research and career planning skills. A further two to three elective modules are selected from a list that includes (but is not limited to) Global English, Minority Languages, Intercultural Communication, Forensic Phonetics, Second Language Acquisition, Translation, Language Impairment, and a post-graduate modules on language teaching and electronic data mining are also available. Students discuss the elective choices with the Programme Director; other options may be possible with the agreement of the module coordinator and the MA Programme Director. Each taught module involves a combination of classwork of two hours a week and independent study of about six hours a week over a twelve-week period. For the third (Summer) trimester, students choose between writing a thesis, research papers or an internship.

MA in Languages & Image Studies

OVERVIEW

As a student of UCD's new MA in Languages and Image Studies, you choose which global language you wish to study (French; German; Italian; Portuguese; Spanish; Catalan), starting at your own current level, whether Beginners, Intermediate or Advanced (CEFR A1-C1). Some students may choose to study two languages across the year. This permits students from a wide variety of backgrounds to take up language learning (accelerated Beginners), or to revisit or perfect a language you have already studied. Image Studies modules all begin at 4:30pm. Portuguese and Catalan may be studied at later times also. In tandem with language studies, students are introduced to image studies from a multilingual perspective, through a variety of modules centred on global film, photography, illustration, or art, and across a wide range of media, genres and languages. All modules draw on School specialist expertise within individual languages and across a wide range of image-related topics. Flexible teaching and learning styles permit students to identify and pursue their own areas of interest in terms of both language and image studies. Students will be guided in analysis and criticism of a range of different types of image, from the perspectives of language-specific and more widely shared cultural contexts.



Students on this programme take core modules in Language(s) and in Image Studies (e.g. European Film Analysis + Body & Matter). You choose Option modules from other language or image studies modules. Students may choose between short pieces of independent research (Guided Research Essays) or a longer Dissertation. All students are encouraged to choose research material that links to the language(s) they are studying and to image-related topics about which they are passionate. Among assessment options, students are often invited to prepare visual/audiovisual presentations.

MMus Music & Culture

OVERVIEW

The UCD School of Music is one of the leading centres for graduate musical study in Ireland. Our graduate programme gives students the opportunity to work with scholars of international standing in the School's core disciplines of historical musicology, ethnomusicology, cultural history and composition. The programme encourages interdisciplinary study by enabling students to take modules in both these areas, while also facilitating specialisation. The MMus degree furnishes students with the core intellectual tools for pursuing musical research and creative practice, whilst also encouraging independent scholarship.

COURSE CONTENT AND STRUCTURE

The degree emphasises progression from taught foundational modules, through focused case studies reflecting the School's major research strengths, to opportunities for independent research. The programme culminates in the writing of a research dissertation on a topic of the student's choosing or the presentation of a portfolio of compositions and/or creative work.

The school has particular expertise in Irish music and recently developed an innovative programme on music in Ireland. UCD also has a number of resident performing ensembles, including UCD Choral Scholars, UCD Symphony Orchestra and UCD Philharmonic Choir, while the Ad Astra academy offers a number of performing arts scholarships. UCD students have access to the new Trapdoor performance space, the AV lab, the composition and gamelan ensembles, and can work with professional ensembles in support of their composition portfolio.
