**Obtaining Ethical Approval for a Master's Thesis Research Project** 

Every **taught Master's thesis research project** - other than purely literature-based deskstudies - must be approved by the **TMREC-EDU** before fieldwork (data gathering) can commence.

There are two variations on the approvals process.

 The first is Full Review, where the TMREC-EDU (the School of Education Taught Masters Research Ethics Committee) discusses the proposal and all supporting documentation. Students submitting for Full Review need in the first instance to fill out an Application for Full Review and email it to their supervisor. Once approved by their supervisor, it then goes for review at the next meeting of the TMREC-EDU. Meeting dates for 2021/22 are given below:

2. The second is by Low Risk Study Review where the supervisor and/or course director adjudges that a full review is NOT required given the low-risk nature and approach proposed in the work. If your study meets these criteria, you need to fill out the Low Risk Study Review Form. Once approved by your supervisor, the student then submits this form by email to <u>education.ethics@ucd.ie</u>. No signatures are required. On successful application, students will then be given a reference number for their study. This reference number is added to the top of their form by the student and then emailed to their supervisor for their records.

**INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:** TMREC-EDU is no longer responsible for overseeing insurance requirements. (In the old process, 'exemption from review' forms were emailed to safety@ucd.ie). This process is now managed online. Students applying *either* for Full Review or for Low Risk Study Review need to complete a mandatory *self-assessment* via the SIRC office at the following link:

Some example conditions for Full Review v. Low Risk Study Review are given below:

## **Requiring Full Review**

- Vulnerable groups
- Sensitive topics (e.g. sexual behaviour, illegal activities, Use of drugs)
- Invasive procedures (e.g. blood sampling)
- Physical stress/distress, discomfort
- Deception of/or withholding information from participants
- Access to data by individuals or organisations other than the investigators
- Conflict of interest issues
- Known Ethical dilemmas
- Any work involving UCD students

# **Requiring Low Risk Study Review**

- Already reviewed and approved by a recognised Research Ethics Committee
- Standard educational practices
- Standard educational tests
- Anonymous surveys or interviews that do not involve collection of identifiable data
- Public observations (e.g. of a large group of people in a public space – not a classroom)
- Research involving persons elected to or candidates for public office
- Research which uses only existing data which is publicly available
