IPE International Student Challenge 2022 Application Form

Programme Overview

Background

The Covid-19 pandemic shows we live in a highly interconnected world. It also emphasizes the inequities in health access and health outcomes between and within countries. However, achieving 'health and well-being for all' is a complex challenge. Many current healthcare systems are under pressure and may not service the most vulnerable populations in societies, in addition the responsiveness to high-impact threats such as a virus pandemic is not always adequate. Recent research on Covid-19 stresses the importance of population health and awareness of social determinants of health.

In this challenge you will work as an international team of trainee health professionals. As part of a consultation with the health professionals of the future, you have been asked by the World Health Organisation (WHO) to contribute to the 13 multilateral health, development and humanitarian agencies committed to the Global Action Plan for Healthy Lives and Well-being for All.² These agencies will support countries to accelerate progress towards the health-related Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Your task is to help them prepare for the next viral pandemic by formulating evidence-based recommendations for improving health equity around the globe.

Focus

The challenge will be suitable to **ALL HEALTH SCIENCES** disciplines for students who have at least completed their first year of undergraduate study and are pre-registration. Students will be briefed about the challenge after which they will be given three weeks to work on it. This will culminate in a video presentation and a final reflective session on the **26th July 2022.**

Learning outcomes

This online team challenge will give students an opportunity to achieve the following learning outcomes:

- 1. Gain an increased understanding of the principles of science communication.
- 2. Gain an increased intercultural understanding of health issues in different countries.
- 3. Develop your understanding of health equity and disease prevention in a global context.
- 4. Gain experience of working as an international and interprofessional team member.

Task: How can we improve health equity and prevent the next pandemic?

Students will be given a task to formulate evidence based recommendations to assist the WHO in contributing to the 13 multilateral health, development and humanitarian agencies committed to the Global Action Plan for Healthy Lives and Well-being for All. To achieve this, students will work in small interprofessional groups to conduct research related to the challenge given to them, formulate up to five evidence-based actions to be recommended to the WHO advisory group and create a five-minute video to present the findings.

In addition, students will also present a short document with reflections about their experiences on how they worked as a team in their group. Each group will comprise of students from different countries and different disciplines.

Certification

On successful completion, each student will be given a certificate of participation as an important recognition for international collaboration. The certificate will indicate the title of the challenge that the students participated in and, where applicable, could enable participants to request credit/recognition at their own institutions.

Costs

There is no cost associated with participating in the challenge.

Application process

- Each University Representative will run an internal application process resulting in nominating 5-7 students to be submitted to Rosie Boodell, r.j.boodell@bham.ac.uk, U21 HSG Administrative Officer, by a final deadline of **Monday 13th June**.
- Following this, students will be contacted to confirm their participation and will be sent final details about the Challenge event.
