New Datasets

ISSDA is pleased to announce the following updates to datasets are now available to request:

New wave of Healthy Ireland

The Healthy Ireland Survey 2021 is now available to request from ISSDA. The Healthy Ireland Survey is an annual interviewer administered

survey conducted on behalf of the Department of Health by Ipsos MRBI. The purpose of the survey is to provide current and credible data about the wide variety of factors which determine health and wellbeing in the population aged 15 years and older.

The topics covered include general health, health service utilisation and key lifestyle factors, such as smoking, alcohol consumption, physical activity, diet, sexual health and wellbeing to monitor the key trends and policy impacts in those areas. It also offers flexibility for the substitution of further modules to meet particular policy needs, including cross-sectoral /health determinant 'health in all policies' issues.

New wave of EU-SILC

The CSO have released data from the 2022 Survey on Income and Living Conditions (EU-SILC) to ISSDA. The Survey on Income and Living Conditions (SILC) in Ireland is a household survey covering a broad range of issues in relation to income and living conditions. It is the official source of data on household and individual income and also provides a number of key national poverty indicators, such as the 'at risk of poverty' rate, the consistent poverty rate and rates of enforced deprivation.

The primary focus of the Survey on Income and Living Conditions (SILC) is the collection of information on the income and living conditions of different types of households in Ireland, in order to derive indicators on poverty, deprivation and social exclusion. It is a voluntary survey of private households.

New wave of Labour Force Survey

This latest update from the CSO adds Q1 2023 of the Labour Force Survey to ISSDA.

The Labour Force Survey (LFS) is a large-scale, nationwide survey of households in Ireland conducted by the Central Statistics Office. It is designed

to produce quarterly labour force estimates that include the official measure of employment and unemployment in the state.

Topic Highlight



Citing data

As you would cite an article or book used in your research it is important to also cite data for the following reasons:

- Credit the creators of the data
- Make data easier to identify
- Allow the use and impact of data to be tracked
- Increase the reproducibility of your research

Data citation should contain the following elements:

- Creator
- Publication year
- Title
- Resource type
- Version
- Publisher
- Identifier

Each ISSDA study page includes a suggested citation - follow this or the format required by your publisher.

Below is an example citation for the Healthy Ireland Survey 2021 data -

Department of Health (2023). *Healthy Ireland Survey, 2021* [dataset]. Version 1. Irish Social Science Data Archive. SN: 0021-06.
