
UCD Library's approach to research culture

Why?

IReL Open Access publishing agreements

Removes the significant cost barrier for researchers in publishing OA

OA facilitates broader impact and a citation advantage through greater visibility and access. Ensuring fair and equitable opportunities to publish OA is key so those without funding aren't left behind

Provides access to many of the major publishers which are important to researchers to support their career and competitiveness in funding applications e.g. *Elsevier, Wiley, Taylor & Francis, Springer, American Chemical Society, Royal Society of Chemistry etc.*


Total OA articles published under IReL & Elsevier agreements (all institutions combined):





Were you aware of the Open Access Agreements before starting your publishing journey?




Was the process of availing of the OA deal clear on the publisher's platform? 105 responses

KEY FINDINGS

Could UCD Library support researchers better in availing of OA deals?

- Capped APC allocation agreements uncertainty whether OA quota will be reached by the time the article is published.
- More journals to be included in the deal.
- Extend the scope of the OA agreements to cover other key publishers.
- Raise awareness of OA deals particularly to early career / novice researchers.
- Library support is very much appreciated.

"This is a wonderful service to have available at UCD. If more journals were included, that would be even better, but already it is fantastic to have this available."

"There are some key publishers in mathematics (e.g. the American Mathematical Society) that are not covered by OA. It would be great to extend the scope of the OA agreements to cover these."

"The process was very straightforward, and I am grateful for the funding, however, I wasn't aware it existed before today."

"The way forward will be to have OA with all journals. like it or not, impact factor matters. so, we 'll go for it and we'll publish the paper without OA."

"...the main thing is raising awareness and making it clear, particularly to early career / novice researchers, what it means and how it works. I recently discussed with our section of the school and many faculty were not aware of this."

Research Repository UCD collects, preserves and makes freely available publications including peer-reviewed articles, working papers, book chapters and conference papers created by UCD researchers.

Where material has already been published it is made available subject to the OA policies of the original publishers.

No cost to authors or readers – increases visibility and global impact of research

Approx 15,000 publications free to access online





Research Data Management

Benefits of RDM

Increased quality assurance

- Increases research efficiency
- Facilitate data security and reduces risk of data loss
- Ensure compliance with funder requirements

Facilitates reproducibility of research findings

- Supports research integrity and validation of results
- Reduces incentives to engage in research misconduct

Increases re-use of data by other researchers

- Supports wider dissemination and increased impact
- Enables research through secondary data use

Supporting UCD'S RDM policy

"A framework for the management of research data to ensure that research data is stored, retained, made available for use and reuse, and disposed of according to **best** international practices for data management, as well as in compliance with legal, statutory, ethical, contractual and intellectual property obligations, and the requirements of funding bodies and publishers"

RDM Service Development

- Enhanced training & one-to-one support for researchers, including greater focus on ECRs, helping to build capacity & support research career development
- Assist UCD researchers in developing high quality DMPs via DMPonline @ UCD, supporting legal, ethical & IP obligations as well as best practice
- RDM Community of Practice in collaboration with key campus partners and stakeholders to exchange knowledge & best practice
- Establish a UCD Community on Zenodo supported by advice & assistance from UCD Library


Irish Social Science Data Archive

- ISSDA became the designated Irish service provider to CESSDA in 2021









UCD Digital Library




RDM Survey – Jan 2019



Let's change what we value in research.





for research metrics

Research has impact. Not journals.

Libraries directly pay the financial cost of a culture of journal "prestige" driven by Journal Impact Factors through increased subscription and publishing costs, impacting core library values of openness, equity and bibliodiversity.

An APC to publish a single article in Nature costs €9500 (+ VAT)

More transparent publishing costs and models, underpinned by a system that rewards and values research quality, will help ensure libraries are paying for the services valued by the research community rather than branding and prestige

Key principles to drive cultural change

Research metrics can support, but not supplant, qualitative expert assessment

Fair and transparent research assessment procedures and criteria

Journal Impact Factors should not be used as a surrogate measure of the quality of individual research articles

Recognise the value of all relevant research outputs (e.g. datasets, software and creative works) and other types of contributions, such as training and influencing policy

Support EDI by recognising that many factors may impact upon an individual's research performance, e.g. career breaks, part-time working etc.

Libraries play a key role by providing advocacy, training and advice






What is Digital Literacy?
