

German Studies Curriculum and General Information 2019-20

Ways to study German at the School of Languages Cultures and Linguistics at UCD

You can study German as a major or a minor subject as part of the following programmes:

BA International Modern Languages (DN541), 4-year programme

German plus one or two further languages: for students who wish to focus on two or more languages and their related cultures, and who wish to spend a year studying abroad.

BA Arts (DN520), 3 or 4-year programme

German plus another arts subject (e.g. music, history): for students who want to complement German with another arts discipline or who wish to try out other arts subjects in their first year. A year studying in Germany or Austria is advised (but not obligatory).

BA Humanities (DN530), 4-year programme

either

“Languages, Cultures and Linguistics” pathway: for students interested in linguistics and cultures and who wish to spend a semester or a year studying in Germany or Austria

or

“English, European and World Literatures” pathway: for students interested in literature and who wish to spend a year studying in Germany or Austria.

BComm. International (DN660), 4-year programme (German minor)

For students particularly interested in careers in business and finance and who wish to spend a year studying in Germany or Austria.

BSc Social Sciences (DN700), 4-year programme (German minor), German with Economics, Sociology or Politics

For students interested in a Social Science major and who wish to spend a year studying in Germany or Austria.

German modules may also be chosen as electives by students from other programmes, subject to availability of places.

STAGE ONE (FIRST YEAR)

Choosing the level that is right for you:

We offer German from beginners and non-beginners levels. Students who have studied German for the Irish Leaving Certificate or have reached an equivalent standard elsewhere (at least A2 according to the Common European Framework of Reference [CEFR]) should enter the Non-Beginners stream. At Stage One, the level 1 modules GER10010 German Language Ia and GER10020 German Language Ib cater for this cohort.

Students with no prior knowledge of German should enter the Beginners stream and should register for GER10100 Beginners German A and GER10110 Beginners German B.

If you are not sure about your level and which stream would be right for you, please contact the Head of Subject or the coordinator of one of the level 1 language modules for advice, even if you have been automatically allocated a place in one of the language modules.

Moving forward with German

In addition to meeting Stage Progression requirements (a minimum of 50 credits overall), you need to ensure that you have demonstrated your competence in the German language at each stage. Thus, in order to progress with German at Stage 2, students must pass the relevant level 1 second semester language module (GER10020 for non-beginners, and GER10110 for beginners).

What modules must I take at Stage 1?

For all the BA programmes

Beginners in German must take a minimum of 10 credits from level 1 German modules, to include GER10100 German Beginners A **AND** GER10110 German Beginners B.

Non-beginners in German must take a minimum of 10 credits of modules in level 1 German to include GER10020 German Language Ib and one other German level 1 module.

For B.Comm. International (with German as a Minor)

Beginners in German must take GER10100 German Beginners A, GER10110 German Beginners B and GER10150 German History on Screen.

Non-beginners in German must take GER10010 German Language Ia, GER10020 German Language Ib and GER10150 German History on Screen.

For BSc Social Sciences (with German as a Minor)

Beginners in German must take GER10100 German Beginners A **AND** GER10110 German Beginners B.

Non-beginners in German must take GER10010 German Language Ia **AND** GER10020 German Language Ib.

STAGE TWO (SECOND YEAR)

At stage 2, students continue to attend language modules according to the stream which they entered in first year (i.e. beginners or non-beginners).

Students who completed and passed GER10020 must register for GER20060 German Language IIa and GER20070 German Language IIb. Students who completed and passed GER10100 and GER10110 must register for GER20240 German for Ex-Beginners A and GER20250 German for Ex-Beginners B.

International or elective students who have not taken the level 1 modules and wish to register for level 2 modules, should contact the relevant module coordinator.

Credit requirements according to programmes:

BA Joint Major and BA Humanities (“English, European and World Literatures” pathway or “Languages, Cultures and Linguistics” pathway)

Students must register for a minimum of 25 credits in German (level 2). This must include 10 credits from language modules.

BA International Languages Joint Major

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in German (level 2). This must include 10 credits from language modules.

(BAIML students who take 20 credits at stage 2 must take a minimum of 25 credits in German [level 3] in their Final Year.)

BComm. International

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 2 German modules. This must include the language modules GER20060 and GER20070 **OR** GER20240 and GER20250, as well as the Spring semester module GER20200 Auf Deutsch Handeln.

BSc Social Sciences

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 2 German modules. This must include the language modules GER20060 and GER20070 **OR** GER20240 and GER20250.

Moving from Stage Two to Stage Three

According to UCD regulations, students must have earned a minimum of 110 credits before they are allowed to progress from stage 2 to stage 3.

In addition, students of German must pass their level 2 language modules (GER20060 and GER20070 **OR** GER20240 and GER20250) before being allowed to progress from stage 2 German and/or register for any level 3 language modules.

Many students spend the third year of their programme abroad through the Erasmus+ programme. For International Modern Languages students, BComm. International students, BSc Social Sciences students with a minor in German and BA Humanities students who opted for a joint major in German as part of their pathway, this is an integral part of their programme. BA students may apply for an Erasmus place during the Autumn semester of stage 2 and are encouraged to do so. Before they can take up an allocated place, progression rules above apply.

STAGE THREE/FOUR (FINAL YEAR)

For BA students their final year is their third year in UCD (stage 3). For students who are registered as BA International Modern Languages students or BComm. International students, and BA and BA Humanities students who have spent a year abroad through the Erasmus+ programme, their final year is the fourth year of their programme (stage 4).

Credit requirements according to programmes:

BA Joint Major and BA Humanities

Students must register for a minimum of 25 credits in level 3 German modules. This must include both language modules.

BA Humanities

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 3 German modules. This must include both language modules.

BA International Languages Joint Major

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 3 German modules. This must include both language modules.

(BAIML students who have taken 20 credits in level 2 German modules at stage 2 must take a minimum of 25 credits in level 3 German modules in their Final Year.)

BComm. International

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 3 German modules. This must include both language modules.

BSc. Social Sciences

Students must register for a minimum of 20 credits in level 3 German modules. This must include both language modules.
