AFFILIATED PROJECTS UPDATES

Moral Agency in Election Campaigns (ELECT)

The ELECT project is in its second year and much of the fieldwork is close to completion. In collaboration with YouGov, the team has successfully conducted a survey of over 5,000 citizens in Germany, Italy, the UK and the US concerning citizens' attitudes towards democratic norms in election campaigns. Since January, the team has been dispersed across these four countries, doing in-person surveys and interviews with national election candidates, political professionals and journalists, attempting to understand their attitudes towards democratic norms in election campaigns. The team is excited to analyse our data and begin executing our publication plan in the coming year.

A big congratulations to our team member Leonardo Puleo, who has secured his own research funding to work on illiberalism and party competition at the Université Libre de Bruxelles. Leonardo will remain closely affiliated with the ELECT project going forward. In September, ELECT will welcome a new postdoctoral researcher to the team.

Democracy Challenged

Since its launch in September 2024, Professor Aidan Regan's ERC-funded Democracy Challenged project has made significant progress in exposing how global profit-shifting and corporate tax avoidance fuel the wealth inequalities that undermine democracy. Our interdisciplinary team - spanning political science, economics, law, and data science - is conducting forensic investigations into multi-jurisdictional corporate groups (MJGs), particularly in Big Tech and Big Pharma, where intellectual property is central to tax avoidance and wealth concentration.

We have developed a detailed public-facing blog democracychallenged.com/blog, where we publish in-depth investigations into global tax structures and democratic erosion. Our research was recently featured in a series of detailed articles in The Business Post, which can be accessed [here](#).

The project's [working paper series](#) is now live, showcasing our academic outputs and ongoing research. We have also hosted several public events, including a high-profile conference at the Royal Irish Academy featuring Gabriel Zucman and the EU Tax Observatory ([see events](#)).

Looking ahead, we are working on multiple research papers and continuing detailed forensic accounting investigations into specific Big Tech and Big Pharma groups. Our team is also engaged in fieldwork, EU policy engagement, and presenting findings at major academic conferences over the summer, including the Society for the Advancement of Socio-Economics (SASE).

The Irish Polling Indicator

The Irish Polling Indicator (IPI), Ireland's leading polling aggregator, has received significant media attention over the past year. The IPI featured prominently in [five weekly data-driven articles](#) for the RTÉ News website in the run-up to the 2024 general election. The articles focused on turnout, incumbency advantage, public opinion, and vote transfers and were widely cited by major news organisations and political commentators. The IPI was [highly accurate](#) in predicting the 2024 general election. On average, the election results deviated by less than 0.6 percentage points from the aggregated estimate.

Maintainer Stefan Müller has appeared on multiple television and radio programmes in Ireland and abroad to discuss public opinion trends and electoral developments.

The Polling Indicator's influence has grown across the media landscape, with The Guardian and BreakingNews.ie launching their own poll trackers based on IPI data. Recently, a new dataset was released, compiling all polling results and aggregated estimates from 1987 to 2024.
