



Applying to UCD

There is a wide range of routes into UCD Arts and Humanities.

Irish Leaving Certificate Applicants

Admission to UCD Arts and Humanities programmes is based on the points system for students who take the Leaving Certificate examinations. In order to be eligible to compete for any course, you must obtain a minimum of Grade H5 in two subjects and a minimum of Grade O6/H7 in the remaining four subjects. Irish, English and a third language are required subjects. Application is through the CAO process. Go to www.ucd.ie/registry/admissions for more information.

HEAR

School leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds who are under the age of 23 as of 1 January 2019 and resident in the Republic of Ireland, may apply to Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) scheme. Go to www.ucd.ie/registry/admissions for more information.

A-Level applicants

Applicants must have six recognised subjects, according to course requirements. They must obtain Grade C, or better, in two subjects at A-level (A2) and Grade C, or better, in the remaining four subjects at GCSE. Applicants from Britain and Northern Ireland are generally exempt from the requirement of presenting Irish. Go to www.ucd.ie/myucd/alevel for details.

Mature Applicants

A mature applicant is anyone who is at least 23 years of age on 1 January of the proposed year of entry. For admission in September 2019, your date of birth must be on or before 1 January 1996. Application is through the CAO and all students must sit an MSAP test.

DARE

DARE is for school leavers (under 23 years old as at 1 January 2019) who have the ability to benefit from and succeed in higher education, but who may not meet the points for their preferred course due to the impact of a disability. Go to www.ucd.ie/registry/admissions for more information.

EU applicants

EU applicants must meet the same minimum entry requirements as Irish CAO school leavers. Go to www.ucd.ie/registry/admissions for details.

University Access Courses

Access courses designed to help adult learners prepare for university are available in Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, Law, Science, Engineering and Agricultural Sciences. The UCD access courses guarantee entry to BA degree programmes, once course assessment criteria are met.

Entry with QQI-FET qualification

All Arts and Humanities programmes have reserved places for applicants with appropriate QQI-FET (Level 5 or 6) qualifications and modules. Applicants must have a minimum of distinction in five modules and are admitted on a competitive basis.

Non-EU students are eligible to apply for admission to a limited number of places on BA programmes. Application is made via www.ucd.ie/international/apply except where an agent is used.
