## LARC 10070 Landscape Studio 1A

This largely studio based module introduces the student to the world of landscape architecture and the design process. Emotional and intuitive responses to different types of landscapes are explored and rationalised via a series of class exercises and discussion. Conceptual design and skills essential to visualization of the design process are introduced. Graphic techniques are taught. Students are encouraged to express themselves graphically, verbally and in written form. Students are familiarised with the seasonal nature of the landscape through visits to parks, gardens and sites of interest.

Students keep a visual record of these visits including surveys, botanical drawings, observations and relevant research. This notebook will form a visual record of individual observations and is to be maintained throughout the four years of study.
